CLAIM WETS TRYING TO RETARD PROGRAM

John G. Lethbridge Declares Temperance Question Now in Politics.

DEFENDS THE O. T. A.

General Hogarth Attacks Government On Backus Deal.

Toronto, Feb. 9.—Progress was made in the debate on the reply to the speech from the throne in the Legislature yesterday afternoon. John G. Lethbridge proclaimed that the temperance question was in politics, that the liquor forces were combined to defeat the O. T. A. by organizing attacks against the Drury government. He maintained that the act had been a success and its enforcement satisfactory. He commended the government on its record in assisting agriculture and building good roads.

General Hogarth, Conservative member for Port Arthur, on the other hand made a strong attack on the government, accusing it of giving W. E. Backus, under terms which prevented any competition, the English River limits for \$50,000, when they were really worth \$25,000,000. He aired the old dispute between Port Arthur and Port William in regard to Nipigon development, blaming the administration, and particularly Hon. H. Mills, member for Port William, and minister of mines, for upsetting the negotiations with the Great Lakes Paper Company to take power. J. E. Thompson (Northeast Toronto) moved the adjournment of the debate and will resume on Monday.

Calls It "Pure Bunk."

That E. W. Backus in securing the English River limits for \$50,000 had been given by this government, without any real competition, pulp and timber resources which are worth \$25,000,000 on the stump over and above the crown dues was the contention of General Hogarth. "To say this was a good deal in any shape, manner or form is pure bunk," he said, claiming that the limits contained six million cords of spruce and hemlock, 250,000,000 feet of red and white pine suitable for the manufacture of lumber and a million ties. He said that Mr. Justice Logie in the Shevlin-Clark investigation had valued such red and white pine at \$20 a thousand, but if he fixed such a price "my friends in New Ontario would laugh at me." He did, however, value it at \$15 a thousand on the stump in arriving at the \$25,000,000 total valuation. He ridiculed the timber commission and claimed it had done much harm in Ontario.

John G. Lethbridge, Middlesex West, outlined the growth of the temperance movement and referred to the speech of E. K. Honnuth in the house, in which that member had said the question was out of politics. He contrasted this with the statement of M. M. MacBride that the premier and attorney-general had dragged the question back into politics.

Claims It a Success.

"I want to tell you the temperance question is in politics," asserted Mr. Lethbridge with emphasis. "Who put it there? It was the opponents of prohibition." He read letters from the Liberty League and other similar organizations, in reference to working up opposition to the O. T. A. and the Drury Government in the House, indicating that the hopes to kill prohibition were always linked up with defeating Premier Drury. "The Ontario temperance act has been in force for six years, and some of my friends of the opposition side claim it has not been a success. I say it has been a success. Conditions in Ontario have improved a hundred fold, yes a thousand-fold in these six years. In the three years I have been in Toronto attending the Legislature I have not seen a drunken man."

U. S. WILL AVOID MIXING IN NEAR EASTERN ROW

American Destroyers Cruising in Troubled Waters To Watch Own Interests.

Washington, Feb. 9.—Although a fleet of American destroyers is cruising in Near Eastern waters to protect interests of the United States, this government expects to remain clear to the Turkey-armed embargo in the same way that it has avoided entanglement in the Ruler dispute. State department officials denied any instructions have been sent to American representatives in the Near East. They knew nothing, they said, of the report that the American commissioner at Smyrna had joined the allies in protesting to the Turks against the ultimatum.

The only information received from the Near East in the last 48 hours has been contained in press dispatches, department officials said, but from these they gathered that the tension has been relaxed somewhat. At the busy department there was no sign of concern over the Near East situation. Read Admiral Mark Bristol, American commander in the Near East, is on his way from Smyrna to Constantinople, and a report is expected upon his arrival. There was no indication that the recall of the fleet of American destroyers is contemplated.

WILL MAKE DIPLOMATS' LIVES MORE PLEASANT

Washington, Feb. 9.—Lives of diplomatic and consular agents in foreign countries are going to be a bit more pleasant if the Rogers' bill, passed by the house late Thursday, becomes law.

The measure consolidates the diplomatic and consular services to the extent of making the personnel interchangeable. It provides for salary increases for the consular branch of the service, and provides an enticement fund for use in foreign lands.

It ends "the dollar diplomacy" by making diplomatic careers possible for those without private fortunes. Under the bill agents would be subject to the usual civil service retirement privileges.

DR. ELLIOTT PORTRAYS ROMANCE IN RESEARCH

Toronto Physician Lectures To Western University Historical Society.

ILLUSTRATES SPEECH

Pays Tribute To Pioneers Who by Sacrifices Aided Humanity.

That even research study on treatment of disease is featured by romance, was the declaration of Dr. J. H. Elliott of Toronto, who addressed the Western University Historical Society of Western University yesterday afternoon, pointing out interesting activities of the medical expedition to Nigeria, of which he was a member.

This Elliott took for his subject, "The Romance of Tropical Medicine," and illustrated his address by lantern slides, depicting the work carried on by Canadian investigators in Africa. "It was romance accompanied by tragedy," began the Toronto physician, "being the same in tropical medicine as elsewhere."

Owed Impetus To Discovery.

He then outlined several researches on tropical diseases, which he claimed owed their great impetus to the discovery of the malaria germ by Ross in 1898, while a member of the army medical corps in India.

"In the 25 years that followed the change was most remarkable," said Dr. Elliott, reviewing the study which led to definite proof that the mosquito acted as a carrier of malaria. This result was far-reaching in preventing disease and the economic value alone saved millions to practically every nation in the world.

Sleeping sickness, with all its mystery and dread to the natives of Africa, was also solved by these medical men, who definitely fixed the guilt on the Tsetse Fly as the communicant to humans. Extermination of this pest wherever possible led to such a reduction of sleeping sickness that industries in the tropics threatened by high mortality of the workers were enabled to be resumed.

Caused by Germ.

Malaria fever was discovered to have been caused by a germ reared in goats' milk, by Bruce in 1889, and the speaker also told of the work conducted on the pathology of the Guinea worm in Africa by himself and colleagues, with the result that definite measures for successful treatment of the unfortunate natives were devised. Relapsing fever was also touched on by Dr. Elliott in his remarks, which were listened to with interest by a large audience at the medical school.

Last night Dr. Elliott addressed members of the medical staff of the Queen Alexandra Sanatorium at Byron.

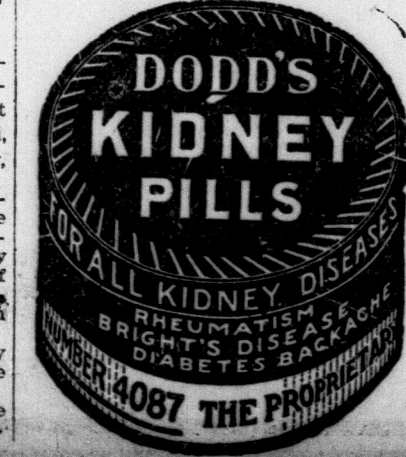

British Peerage Pays Its Homage To Grandson of Country's Ruler

London, Feb. 9.—Baby Lascelles is the master of Chesterfield House. Princess Mary's son, who asserts himself now and then by uttering a lusty squall, is commanding more attention than his grandad, the King of England.

Viscount Lascelles, smiling, the smile that only a father can smile, was kept busy Thursday receiving the highest peers of the United Kingdom. He took all the visitors for a peek at his day-old baby.

The baby is the most discussed and most considered person in the land.

Master Lascelles occupies a suite in the palatial Chesterfield House, with a day and night nursery, bath, of nurses and attendants.

Princess Mary, who is nursing the baby herself, made all the garments that are being worn by the infant.

There is much discussion concerning the title of the baby, which is still nameless. Although a decree of 1917 abolished the titles of prince and royal highness on descendants of the royal family, with the exception of the sovereign's sons or their sons, it is anticipated that both Lascelles and the child will be made peers in their own right.

In view of the enormous wealth at the disposal of Viscount Lascelles, it is probable that the annual "pittance" received by Princess Mary from the government—a mere six thousand pounds annually—will be diverted to the nicknacks for the infant, while his father's money is reserved for his training and future maintenance.

BRITISH LION'S ROAR CALLS TURKS' BLUFF

Arrival of Allied Warships At Smyrna Has Quieting Effect.

London, Feb. 9.—The roar of the British lion has quieted the blustering Turk, thus preventing an outbreak in the Near East, in the opinion of members of the Bonar Law government.

British firmness, as exemplified by the despatch of additional battleships to the Smyrna harbor after the Turks ordered all warships to evacuate, caused the Meclim government

to back down, it is believed.

The first signs of weakness came when the Turkish commander at Smyrna extended the time limit for withdrawal of allied ships from midnight Wednesday until the same hour Thursday.

It is anticipated here that when zero hour approaches Thursday the time limit will be extended indefinitely.

The Turks, those in close touch with the situation point out, are apparently looking for a graceful way out of an embarrassing situation.

One evidence of this is the despatch from Smyrna, which states that the Turkish commander at Smyrna issued the ultimatum because he feared a Greek attack.

Britain, however, is not sitting back complacently after having won the first skirmish in an international game of bluff. With the British cruiser Curacao, under the command of Admiral Nicholson, already playing up and down in the Smyrna harbor, the admiral has ordered the Empress of India and other battleships to the scene.

EXTRADITE LAWYER ON STEALING CHARGE

H. Fisher of Regina Said To Have Stolen Trust Funds To Be Returned.

London, Feb. 9.—Harold Fisher, the Regina, Sask., lawyer, who was arrested here at the request of the Regina authorities on a charge of stealing trust funds, was yesterday committed for extradition to Canada. The magistrate stated that Fisher could not be sent out of the country for fifteen days, in which time an opportunity would be given for an application for habeas corpus in his behalf, if desired.
