> "Another objection offered, con-cluded Dr. MacGregor, " is that min-isters do not have to pledge them-selves to anything." Before a man can begin to study for the ministry in accordance with the requirements of the basis of union, he must be rec-ommended by the session or congre-gation to which he belongs. He must be examined by Presbytery before he goes to college, and at the end of every year of his college course. He must be licensed to preach by pres-bytery and recommended to the conerence for ordination. Then he must satisfy the conference that he is in essential agreement with the dog-trines of the United church before he

in his morning sermon on the subject. "All Grace Abounding," that until the Christians of today get into more personal touch and knowledge of God, as had the Christians of the Victorian age, there would be little power in that Christianity.

'Knowledge and real intimacy with God can not be secured over night or in a hurry," said the speak-er, "it is the fruit of daily systematic communion with Him and the ifting up of our hearts to Him. But. vith that knowledge, comes power o overcome the difficulties of life. which will thereby be greatly sweet

Holiness, however, is important, since without holiness, no man can see God. Holiness on God's part has been defined as 'the glorious fullness of His moral excellence.' That, of ourse, means God's separation from verything evil and His consecration o everything pure. Our holiness lies n sharing God's holiness and that. is not impossible or unattainble, since God has willed it for us. All Should Work.
