CANADA'S TRADE FOR THE YEAR 1913

Figures Given Show Large Increase in Exports Over Previous Years

Ottawa, Feb. 1.—According to figures issued by the Trade and Commerce Department yesterday, the total trade of Canada for 1913, exclusive of coin and bullion, was \$1,119,578,147, an increase over 1912 of \$121,022,958. Of this increase \$23,469,290 was in imports and \$97,553,668 in exports of Canadian products. The largest increase in exports was in agricultural products, which showed a gain of nearly \$66,000,000. It may be noted also that there was an increase of some \$13,000,000 in the export of manufactured goods. In the month of December alone there was an increase of over \$17,000,000 in agricultural products and of nearly \$2,000,000 in manufactured products exported.

Although the increased trade noted above is large, it does not compare so favorably with the increase of 1912 over 1911. In 1912 the total trade increased by \$200,345,019. The increase in imports during 1912 was \$12,044,384, and in exports of domestic goods

WOULD EXTEND I. C. R. TO VANCEBORO, ME.

Best Interests of Maritime Provinces Would be Served by Bridge at St. Leonard's

A Halifax man, writing to The Montreal Gazette on intercolonial Railway expansion, makes the following interesting reference to conditions in this vicinity: "There are two lines crossing New Brunswick, going south—one, the Canada Eastern, from Chatham to Fredericton; the other the International, Campbellton to St. Leonard's. Both are transporters of goods to the United States and both hand over their traffic to the C. P. R. A line, forty miles long, from Fredericton to Vancorbore, would place the Canada Eastern, west of the river at Van Buren, Me., would place the latter line in contact with Acroostook Railway, which also connects with the Maine Central. If Mr. Cochrane can see his way to forward these connections it will serve the business interests of the Maritime Provinces by giving them competing lines south to the United States. Fredericton, the capital, is now on the high road to become a railway centre. It has at present the I. C. R., C. P. R., Valley Railway and the N. E. Central (Maine) Railway, which connecting with Moncton via Chipman, by the N. T. R., gives direct access to Nova Scotia, P. E. Island and Cape Breton."

KILLED SEVERAL; SET FIRE TO VILLAGE

Hellbrom, Germany, Feb. 4.—A sentence of confinement for life in an asylum for the criminal insane, was pronounced by the assize court here today, on a school teacher named Wagner, who on September 6th last year, after setting fire to the village of Muhlausen, Wuestenber, murdered his wife and four children, and afterwards shot ten villagers, dangerously wounding nine and slightly wounding seven others.

The court found that Wagner was irresponsible, when he committed the crimes, as he was suffering from the mania of persecution.

WASTE FROM DESKS GOES INTO BRUSHES

Remnants From One Factory Used as Raw Material For Another

Waste wood in the manufacture of school desks is now being used for the backs of cheap brushes. A large manufacturer of school desks in Michigan had a considerable amount of waste material in sizes which were too short to enter into the manufacture of the smallest desks, and could not be utilized further with his machinery or in his line of work. This material was all hard maple in pieces an inch thick, a foot or so long, and about three inches wide; for a long time it had been consigned to the waste pile and sold as fire-wood. This waste amounted to from 1,000 to 1,500 board feet each day. A nearby manufacturer was using practically this quantity of maple, which he was sawing up into small pieces for making the backs of cheap brushes.

Members of the Forest Service, investigating methods of eliminating factory waste, conceived the idea that the blocks used by the brush factory could be readily secured from the waste of the school desk manufacturer, and on this basis an arrangement of mutual benefit was soon concluded. Arrangements were made so that the brush manufacturer now places orders with the other firm for its raw material and what was formerly waste is now a source of profit.

Bath, Maine, Feb. 2.—Workmen blasting at Popham Beach uncovered today what is believed to be a vein of coal, leading in from the ocean. Lumps of coal have been washed ashore at that point for many years.

Ottawa, Feb. 2.—Word has been received here of the serious illness of the father of Hon. Louis Coderre at St. Ours, Quebec. He is not expected to live. The Secretary of State has been called to his bedside.

LITTLE CHANCE OF TEAM TO BISLEY

Decision Prohibiting the Appearance Accepted as Final and Universally Regretted

London, Feb. 2.—The Bisley correspondent of the Morning Post holds out little hope that the War Office will give way and allow aperture sights to be used by the Canadian team at Bisley. In fact, it appears from the correspondence that has passed between the National Rifle Association and the Army Council that the whole subject of the Canada team and the Ross rifle has already been discussed. "If Canadians have any grievance," adds the Post correspondent, "it is against the War Office. I do not think there is any likelihood of an exception being made in the case of the Ross rifle, as it would give the Canadian marksmen a clear advantage over their comrades who were using open sights on Lee-Enfield rifles. Three months ago, I will be recalled, the War Office gave an intimation to the National Rifle Association that all military assistance would be withdrawn from the Bisley meetings unless the territorial competitions were conducted in accordance with the munition regulations. Moreover, the War Office has received an offer from a number of influential gentlemen to form a Territorial Force Association to do the work now done by Bisley on lines acceptable to the Army Council."

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
