Compared with last year, there has been a very great improvement, both in treight and passenger traffic. Business has also been done at better rates, and there is still a good demand. During the past week we have refused freights for different places; which we could not possibly supply.

The Strikes Have Injured His Business.

Mr. Wm. Goulding, foot of Frederick street, vessel owner, said: My trade is principally in stone, and, speaking generally, it has been pretty low on account of the strikes. This has made a great deal of difference to us, but things are looking up a bit now, and it will be better when the carpenters strike gets settled. Builders do not care to put in the foundation if they cannot get along with the work. I have a good deal of stone lying here unsold on that account. My vessels are the Helen, Maple Leaf, Ballow, Marcia Hall and McBride. The Marcia Hall is loading timber at Whitby, and the McBride is merely employed on the Bay. The stone I generally get from South Bay and the Lake Shore. They take lumber down and bring coal, timber and stone hack. The harvest trade is coming on and this will give work for three vessels in the fall. I should not have been so busy had I not had a contract with the Corporation for a large supply of stone for roads, which is not yet completed. This has kept us busy, but the season has not been a good one for me.

The Harbor Haster's Opinions.

Mr. Morgan Baldwin (Harbor Master) stated

As to passenger traffic, there ought to be some better system of management at the wharves. Vessels are getting ligher freights this year than they have for a long time.
