London, Aug. 2.—The news that the Emperor of Japan had declared war against the Emperor of China reached the British Foreign Office, but was not made public in London until late. The intelligence could hardly create surprise, but it is not too much to say that it was received with dismay almost amounting to consternation in all the diplomatic centres of Europe.
