HEALTH TALKS By John B. Haber, A. M., M. D.

Pompholyx is an extremenly rare disease. The trouble at bottom is with the nervous system. In this ailment blisters appear in the skin, especially the soles of the feet.

There is intense itching, tingling and burning. The blisters, or pimples, at first deeply imbedded in the skin and showing no tendency to rupture, soon become prominent and appear like little sago seeds. In time the contents of these blisters are yellow, and they come together, forming blebs or blisters. Soon nothing remains but reddened, painful and inflamed skin.

The cause of pompholyx is generally nervous debility; women are more commonly affected. The treatment is usually effective, but the tendency to the recurrence of the allment is difficult to overcome. In such cases leading the hygienic life works wonders. The doctor must prescribe remedies suitable to individual cases and soothing applications locally.
