Toronto, Nov. 18.—Receipts at the Union stockyards were 66 cars, with 1,194 cattle, 95 calves, 700 hogs and 667 sheep and lambs.

The market was strong and prices firm on all grades of cattle. The run was light and good to choice qualities of butcher cattle were scarce. There was a little extra demand for good heavy feeders, several Canadian buyers looking for small lots to fill up vacant stalls. The demand for good stockers and feeders for the Buffalo market was also active and prices were firmer. There was a strong active market for lambs and prices were 10c to 15c higher than yesterday. Hogs were quoted a little easier, though a few lots sold at 89, fed and watered, unchanged from yesterday.
