

Boy labor is a great assistance to the farmers, vegetable and fruit growers of the vicinity of Kingsville. Hundreds of them are employed at various kinds of work they are able to do. The stores and banks are being scoured for 5 and 10-cent pieces. The growers have found that nothing pleases the boys as much as to know that if they earn only 5 cents, that they will be paid spot cash for their labor when completed, when working piecework, or to be paid every evening the sight of one of his eyes is gone, besides other injuries. Fred, the 14-year-old son of John F. Grimes, M. C. R. agent, Brigden, was painfully hurt when taking a short cut through the yards of the Hayne Milling Co.
