In His Home at Halifax, on 71st Anniversary of His Birth.

Halifax, Jan. 3.—Senator Charles E. Church died as he was ascending the stairway to his own house here this afternoon, on the 71st anniversary of his birth and four years since his appointment to the Canadian senate. Hon. Mr. Church had been in poor health for some time and had not been out of his house for a couple of weeks, but no immediate danger was anticipated. He was born in Tanook Island, Lunenburg, and was elected to the Nova Scotia legislature, and was first provincial secretary and then commissioner of works and mines in the local government. A widow survives.
