go before the Town Council praying
for the extension of Park street to
Queen street and has already been
signed by a large number of the rate-
payers. Park street besides being one
of the prettiest residential streets in
the town is the street on which the
school building is situated, the
finest public building of the town.

At present it is quite out of the
way from the west end of the town,
the only approach being by a cross
street which is never in the best of
condition, and is not only inconven-
ient for the residents of the street,
but is objectionable from several
points of view as a means of ap-
proach to the school-house for the
school-children of the south and west
sections of the town.

The extension would be a short
one and the right of way should be
acquired without much of an outlay.
Doubtless the suggestion will receive
favorable consideration from the
Town Council.
