Specimens of a fine magnetite have been brought from what is termed a large deposit at the entrance of a bay on the north side of Athabasca Lake and another large deposit has been examined between Lake Winnipeg and Hudcon Bay. Bedded ores of mang niferous spathic iron, broken up by the inton Bay. Bedded ores of many interous spatnic fron, broken up by the intense frost are also cattered over the Nistupoka Islands near the eastern shore of Hudson Bay and every research throws new light upon the hidden resources of the extremely metaliferous north. This completes this superficial glance at the distribution of iron ores in British America. The distribution of iron industries is not at all commensurate with the expanse of raw material. One by one the iron industries of Quebec-some of which were almost co-ereal with the existence of the colony—have dropped out and re-inquished the markets to Nova Scotia. This is of course owing to lack of fuels and fluxes, but it is none the less a stain upon the character for progressiveness which Canada has won.
