

him in 1922-23 that Christie had resigned from the Department,^{*} and at that time they had little connection or collaboration. But on his reappointment he seems to have made the adjustment and to have been useful to Mr. King, even though it is possible that Christie's activities were confined once more to pieces of research, memoranda, legal commentaries and possible occasional consultations. In later years Mr. King expressed in Parliament and elsewhere his eulogies and appreciation of Christie's services.

Almost immediately after his reappointment to the Department, as Counsellor, Christie renewed his
