We have heard a great deal about the number of Canadians who have gone to the United States during the past few years. I have often thought that hon. gentlemen oppositeyes, and hon, gentlemen possibly in all parts of the House-have not given as much attention as they should to the actual causes that have brought about in many cases the emigration of Canadian workmen to the United States. A few years ago the United States inaugurated a quota restriction regulation, with the result that during the boom times, particularly the early part of 1923, industry in the United States found it difficult to get a sufficient number of workmen, and through friends of Canadians in the United States opportunities were frequently offered to Canadian workmen to go to that country. Another new condition in the United States is the immigration into that country of people from Mexico. I am going to ask permission to place on Hansard, Mr. Speaker, a statement showing the number of immigrant aliens admitted to the United States from Canada, Newfoundland and Mexico during the two years ended December 31, 1924, by months.

The statement is as follows:

These figures show that in 1923 the number of Canadians who went to the United States was 182,369, and the number of Mexicans 81,-000, while in 1924 the figures were 159,098 from Canada and 59,268 from Mexico. But there is another side to that question: not all the Canadians who went to the United States remained there, by any means. Many of them went there to work for a while and to return to Canada as soon as they could. I have here a report showing the number of Canadians who returned from the United States, after an absence of six months or longer, during the eleven months ended February 28, 1925, and I would ask permission to place it on Hansard. The statement is as follows:

I also have a statement of Canadians who went to the United States and returned within six months, each of whom paid the head tax of \$8 on his admission to the adjoining republic, which amount was refunded when he returned to Canada.
