Labour Unions Returns Act. Information not available through the Canada Department of Labour survey will be obtained directly by Statistics Canada (Dominion Bureau of Statistics).

The following reporting requirements are affected by this arrangement: (a) The major portion of Section A is filed indirectly with the Dominion Statistician. (b) The reference date for the reporting is January 1, 1971. This will affect only unions with fiscal year-end other than December 31, 1970. (c) The signature of the union official submitting the report to the Canada Department of Labour survey is accepted, for that report, in lieu of the verifications by two executive board members.

1. What are the members of the decorations committee looking into reclassification of military awards?

2. To which minister is the committee responsible?

3. What are the terms of reference and its responsibilities?

Hon. Gérard Pelletier (Secretary of State): 1. The question of a reclassification of (military) awards has not been examined by the Government Decorations Com-

mittee; rather, a group of officials including representatives of: the Governor General's Secretariat, the Privy Council Office, the Department of National Defence and the Department of the Secretary of State has been examining the implications of the establishment of awards for outstanding service and achievement by military personnel.

2. The officials referred to in 1 reported to the Prime Minister.

3. The officials were to examine the implications of the establishment of a comprehensive set of honours and awards and to provide new mechanisms for its administration.

4. The officials recently made their conclusions available to the Prime Minister.

5. It is not customary to table in Parliament internal reports by officials to ministers.

FUEL USED BY CANADIAN COMMERCIAL PROPJETS OR JETLINERS

Question No. 580-Mr. Nielsen:

What Canadian airlines operating commercial propjets or jetliners are using (a) JP4 fuel (b) kerosene?

Mr. Gérard Duquet (Parliamentary Secretary to Minister of Transport): The major Canadian airlines use both kerosene and JP4 fuel as tabulated below.

As all current turbojet and turboprop engines are cleared to use both JP1 (kerosene) and JP4 fuel as specified in the approved Flight Manuals, the operator may choose whichever fuel is most suitable. The main factors in the selection are availability, cost and aircraft range requirement. If the range of an aircraft is limited by fuel tank capacity, greater range can be achieved with JP1 because of its greater energy content per gallon.

POSSIBILITY OF PLACING ALL FEED GRAIN SALES UNDER JURISDICTION OF THE WHEAT BOARD EXCEPT FARM-TO-FARM SALES
