Although the work has been in the hands of historians engaged upon the special period to which it relates, it is scarcely known in our public libraries or in private collections of American history.

The above is an immaculate copy in pristine condition, having been wrapped in paper since the day of its publication in 1866. It is one of the finest examples from the famous Munsell Press; the typegraphy of which has not to this day been excelled by any American printer.

A valuable statement of events of the period from a French standpoint, and not elsewhere obtainable. The editor and translator has added numerous notes, and the

index is very thorough, covering sixteen pages.

"Our impressions of these events have been chiefly derived from English authors who often evinced a partisan spirit in their narratives of the time, and who, even when they sought to leave a faithful record, could at most present a partial statement of what they saw on their side. The incidents of a battle or siege, witnessed from an English camp, might appear quite different if seen through the loop-hole of a fort, or from behind the intrenchmenta of the French, and a full and faithful knowledge of the whole subject can only be obtainable by the study of the historians of both parties."- Preface.

The author, who was an Engineer and Officer in the French Army during the whole period of the War, witnessed the events at Ticonderoga, Oswego, Niagara, and Fort Levis; all of which he described with great minuteness. Of the other principal events of the War, he gives details from accounts received from witnesses and from French authorities. Forts Niagara and Levis were completed and defended by him; and he gives full details of the Sieges, both of which terminated in surrender to the English. One prominent feature of the work is the freedom with which he exposes the frauds and corruption of the French officials.
