

BY MR. ROSS:

Q. What date is that again? A. June 1st, 1940.

Q. And that forms part of the statement that was sent to Ottawa which said that they were opposed to conscription for overseas service? A. No.

Q. It forms part of that article, does it not?

MR. DUPUIS: In justice to the witness I am going to read a telegram which was sent from the director in chief and which states:

MR. BENICE: What is the date of that?

MR. DUPUIS: The date is not given. It was before the resolution was passed and it says, "entire membership in Canada is in full support of the Dominion of Canada's programme of national defence".

MR. ROSS: What is that date? Was it about the middle of September, 1940? Where was it sent from?

WITNESS: It originated in the United States and from now on pretty well when I speak of the policy of Technocracy Incorporated I refer to it as it has found expression in the United States since June 20, 1940.

BY MR. DUPUIS:

Q. Before you go further, would you tell me if your organization is banned in the United States? A. No, sir, it is not.

MR. P.M. ANDERSON: Before Mr. Norris starts on any new section I have a few questions I would like to ask him with respect to two circulars, Mr. Chairman; with your permission.

THE CHAIRMAN: Yes.

MR. ANDERSON: The first one is "Technocracy and War". It is issued by continental headquarters Technocracy Incorporated, 155 East 44th Street, New York, N.Y., and this one went to Technocracy Incorporated, Northside, Saskatchewan.
