CLIMATE

Victoria has a clin ate devoid of extremes of heat or cold, and nich similar to that of the south of England. There are practically but two seasons, spring and fall; zero weather, sunstrokes and prostrations from the heat are afflictions only known to Victorians through newspaper reports from other parts of the world.

TEMPERATURE

The moderate temperature of the summer season makes Victoria the ideal place for holiday seekers. Her proximity to the Pacific Ocean and the Japan current flowing past her shores, keep the temperature of the winter above freezing. During the summer months the prevailing winds are from the southwest, which, passing over the snowcapped Olympic Mountains and the Straits of Juan de Fuca, are comfortably tempered before reaching the City of Victoria. No day is so hot as to be uncomfortable, and no night so warm as to warrant discarding the blanket. The thermometer rarely registers, even on the hottest days in summer, over 75°.
