superiors in station; he must make it his study to recommend himself to notice by a diligent discharge of his duties, and strict obedience to the orders and commands of his superiors, recollecting that he who has been accustomed to submit to discipline, will be considered best qualified to command.

LVII.—Every member of the Police establishment will bear in mind the extreme importance of making himself perfectly well acquainted with such parts of the law relating to the office and duties of a Policeman, as is necessary, to enable him, with a due regard to his own safety, to act efficiently for the protection of the public.
