## PROBABLY BLOCKED

Proposed Line Cannot Run to Points Which Make the Money.

IS CANADA'S SCHEME OUT OF IT?

Eastern Extension Cable Company in 1893

was laid on the table. A pretty full report of the remarks of Sir Mackenzie and lessrs. Scott and Mills will be found below, as well as a synopsis of the agreement, one of the most surprising things about which is that, although it was received by Lord Aberdeen in November, 1893, it as not been made public until now, when the five-year limit mentioned in clause seven has expired. Where the despatch has been all these years is not very clear.

Sir Mackenzie Bowell, who was in Australia at the time this agreement was entered into, sai dto-night that he had never heard of it until a few days ago, and could not explain why it had never been made public. The general effect of the agreement is that under its provisions any Pacific cable from Canada to Australia could not now be extended to Hong Kong and Singapore, so that important feeder to business of cable will be lost. It does not, however, in any way prevent the laying of a cable between Canada and Australia.

UP AGAINST A SNAG.

Ottawa, April 28 .- (Special.) -Before the of the Government to the report of the action the Imperial Government proposed read a cable despatch, stating that the British Government intended to guarantee to the fullest extent suggested by the committee of 1897. Sir Mackenzie did not know that the committee, of which he had been a member, had made any recommendation on that score. In addition, the paragraph stated that the Eastern Extension Company had called their agent home from Australia.

It was evident from all that had transpired, he said, that Mr. Chamberlain was favorable to the construction of the cable on British soil alone. He did not know if the extraordinary infivence which the Eastern 'Extension Company possessed would succeed in effecting this, but if it did it would delay the construction of the cable for some years. He had been greatly struck at the apithy of the Australian colonies on this point. The late Sir John Pender and others, on behalf of the Eastern Extension Company, had made representations that they had never been subsidized. This was not so, as the report of the late Government showed that they had been largely subsidized, and had a reserve of some millions, extracted from the pockets of those who used the line. The importance to Canada was this, that, while the old adage, that trade followed the flag, was true, it was advisable and necessary that there be cable communication to extend this trade.

The Imperial side of the question was also very grave. Why this change of position had taken place he could not say, but it was detrimental to Imperial interests. Hear, hear.] Whatever was of importance to Imperial interests was also important to Canada. He hoped the Government, after having taken the stand it had and proposing to ask the House for a vote towards the construction of the cable, would take this matter into its serious consideration. He had a great many extracts from newspapers to read, but he would content himself with one from The Bullionist of London, England, which pointed out that Canada's action was more aid to the Imperial service than the proposal of the Australian colonies to maintain a ship of war in connection with the Imperial navy, because it was impossible to move men or ships without cable communication. This view of the question had not been so strongly emphasized before. There was a strong influence in the Colonial Office on this matter.

Colonial Office Alert.

When he had been appointed a commissioner within three days of the Colonial Office being notified old reports made years before were sent out from the Colonial Office as to the status of the scheme. These reports condemned the scheme as impossible and extravagant, consequently, when Bir Sandford Fleming and himself arrived in Australia, they were met by these documents. Another point was that as far back as 1893, when Canada was negotiating in this way, the Imperial Government was granting powers to the Eastern Extension Company, which prevented anyone else from landing on their shores. The present plan of the Extension Company was to extend their line from Queensland and Caledonia to the Phillippine Islands, and then to San Francisco, and so to Europe, excluding Canada.
