"That inasmuch as the organization of the fire department is a municipal matter, and that one of the chief features of municipal control is the payment of proper wages and fair dealing with employes, and that, therefore, there is not likely to arise the difficulties which frequently arise between but in connection with municipal management we must hold the head of the department responsible for the efficiency of the service and, in the case of the fire department, for the discipline of the force; but we must also recogsize that men who join the fire brigade do not lose their right as citizens to become connected with organizations which have for their object the mutual improvement and general well being of their members, and in so far as the proposed organization is for the advancement of the general well being of its members along lines which will not interfere with the efficiency and discipline of the force, the board is of opinion that the organization be approved approve of any organization if it would interfere with the freedom of the chief of the brigade to regulate and control the brigade in such a manner as may be necessary in the public interest."
