Famous Editorial Writer Advocates "a Public Defender."

Among the advocates of the plan to establish public defenders in every municipality which contains a public prosecutor, as outlined in Harry Raver's screen production of "The Public Defender," is Dr. Frank Crane, the well-known editorial writer of the New York Globe.

Dr. Crane is enthusiastic about the movement, and has written of its progress frequently. Recently in a two-column article on the subject he said in part: "If we have a public prosecutor or district attorney, why not a public defender? It is not as much the business of the state to protect the innocent as it is to convict the guilty? One of the best results of establishing the office of public defender is that it will help remove the feeling entertained by so many people that the courts are only for the wealthy. This feeling has been unfortunately but too well grounded."

Since Dr. Crane first started to write on the public defender question, and pointed out the necessity of such an officer in our judicial system, over nineteen officials of this character have been appointed throughout the United States.
