\$19.00 PRICE FOR HOGS TO BE AGAIN SET, PREDICT BUYERS

Usual Fall Decline Absent This Year.

BLAME DAVIES' BUYING CONTRACT WITH IMPERIAL GOVERNMENT RESPONSIBLE.

Unless the steady increase of hog values is arrested local pork men predict that the \$19 mark will be reached before the winter. Although pork prices generally decline quite substantially at this time of the year, no such action will take place this season, according to hog buyers of the city.

D. W. Flannigan, chief buyer for the city, said that the reason for the unusually high price of hogs is not only the dearth of porkers in the country, but the action of the Government in agitating for two beefless days during the week.

He said that beef is the cheapest meat obtainable, it being about seven cents per pound cheaper than pork. Notwithstanding this fact, the advice of the Government is for the people to conserve beef. There would be no beef for the people of Canada and the soldiers were an embargo placed on all beef going over the border.

CHELSEA GREEN CHURCH HONORS STUDENT-PASTOR WHO LEAVES FOR COLLEGE

Active Little Congregation Shows Appreciation of Work.

Though one of the smallest churches in the city, probably not one can be found which is more thoroughly alive than the Chelsea Green Presbyterian.

In the last six months some ten or twelve new members have been received, five of these at the communion services held last Sunday. The women's Bible class presented two new members, the bread plates and linen for the communion service, and Mrs. Malcolm MacLellan a charming bow, in memory of her little daughter, who died some years ago.

W. Monteth, a theological student, who has been in charge of the congregation during the past six months, is leaving next week to continue his course, and all this week has been devoted to activities in his honor. Monday evening a concert was given by the Young People's Society and Tuesday evening a large number of people attended the service at the meeting of the Junior League.

In proportion to the size of the congregation, there probably wasn't a more largely attended prayer meeting in London last Wednesday night than at Chelsea Green. Friday afternoon the mission band, named after Mr. Monteth, assembled in full force, and on the evening of the Junior and adult classes. Tomorrow, the last Sunday of the month, will be at Chelsea Green, to be a rally day and harvest home celebration.

On Monday evening there will be a social evening, which is to be a farewell for Mr. Monteth and a reception for Rev. J. R. Harris, who is assuming duties as minister next week, and Mrs. Harris.

NOVA SCOTIA FRUIT SELLS IN LONDON AT HIGHEST PRICE ON RECORD.

Nine barrels of Nova Scotia apples arrived in the city today to be sold locally by the Steele Fruit Company. The price of the fruit was \$1.25 per bushel, which is an average value of \$2.25 a bushel, the highest price ever paid in the district for apples. It is said that they are of the finest quality yet secured, but G. J. Guymer of the Steele Fruit Company is doubtful if such high priced apples will find favor with the public.

Y. W. C. A. TAKES OVER ITS NEW QUARTERS ON SATURDAY NEXT

Moves Into Old Fraser House Property Then.

MEANS WORK EXTENSION Necessary Added Accommodation Provided by Large Building Being Rented.

The Young Women's Christian Association, which has leased the Fraser House on King street, between Richmond and Clarence, in order to obtain more accommodation for the rapidly expanding work, will take possession of the new premises on October 6. It is understood the association has still an option on the property but is renting for a time in order to determine if the site and building are suitable for the work to be done.

The building has the advantage of being situated most centrally and has plenty of accommodation for club and class rooms and also for rooms where the members may entertain their friends.

Thanks to the greater accommodation, opportunity will be afforded for extension of the travel's aid department, with more provision for the accommodation of transient workers. The home on Wellington street has been filled to overflowing and has a waiting list, and the Fraser House will help solve the boarding problem. In addition, dining-room accommodation will be afforded for a much larger number than formerly.

Those closely associated with the work here feel that the value of accommodation for the organization of clubs and classes is of great importance. The move, the association expects to very greatly extend the benefits and influence of its work to the girlhood and womanhood of the city, as well as to the travelers whom it may serve.

FORESTRY "NINE" WON ITS GAME BEFORE ROYALTY

London Member of Corps Describes Baseball Witnessed by King and Queen.

A baseball game played by Canadians and witnessed by the King and Queen and the Prince of Wales, was described in a letter from Pte. A. Ross, 75th Company, Canadian Forestry Corps, to his wife, Mrs. A. Ross, 244 Colborne street.

"The forestry team won," he writes, "by a score of two to one. They scored for the first time in the last half of the eighth inning. When the other team came to bat in the ninth it too scored one run. The forestry scored the winning run in the second half of the ninth inning."

"I sat about 30 feet from the King and Queen and when they left they passed about eight feet from me and had a pretty good look at their majesties."

In another part of this letter he says, "We are at last out of quarantine and have moved into this. I have been one of the towns here two or three times in the evening. It is three miles from the city and is a beautiful place. It was once to Sarnia with the motor transport for coal, but I only made the one trip as they took me out to assist in repairing one of the motor trucks."

"They are finding out what the men can do and we are now the 75th draft. Two drafts left lately. I was outside the hut the other night about 10 o'clock and it was a grand sight to see the searchlights sweeping the heavens for enemy craft. There are lots of women around here but we keep away from them as we have no desire to be sent to the hospital. We are being organized and getting ready to move some time. Soon we get our horses and transport here and take them with us when we go. I was up before the medical board and the board listed me as 'A2.' What the technical board listed me as, I don't know."

Before enlisting he was employed here with the Grand Trunk Railway and the London Electric.

NEARLY 60 SIGN UP IN CITY FOR SERVICE WEEK

C. E. F. and Home Unit Recruiting Picks Up, According to Returns.

300 ELIGIBLES EXAMINED

Friday and Saturday Rush Slackens Somewhat, But Big Total Reached for Week.

ORDER RE-EXAMINATION

Men in "A" and "B" Classifications Must Come Up Once More.

Nearly sixty men signed up here with C. E. F. units and home defence corps during the past week, according to unofficial returns. It is estimated that during the week in addition to these nearly 800 men between the ages of 20 and 35 applied for examination only under the Military Service Act, and that about 130 of these were categorized as "Class A2," or fit for overseas service with a combatant unit. About 80 were rejected and the remainder were categorized as class "B2," or fit for overseas service with a non-combatant unit, or class "C," fit for service in Canada or doubtful.

The class "A2" and class "B2" men will have to be re-examined before they are given a final categorization or certificate of rejection.

Applications for Rush Slackens. A slight slackening in the rush of applicants for examination by the medical board at the armories was noticeable both today and Friday. Seventy-one men were examined by the two boards on Friday, and although this surpasses the number handled on the first two days of the week it is not equal to Wednesday and Thursday's showing, when more than 100 men were examined.

Five of the men who applied on Friday enlisted. C. A. Graham, Scotsman qualified in class "A2" and was detailed to recruiting duty. A. P. Pope qualified in class "A2" and will be with the United Ride. H. H. McCullough, an Irishman, came up to class "A2" standards and was detailed to the Army Service Corps. H. G. Galbraith, a Scotsman, was detailed to the A. M. C. He qualified in class "C." W. J. McEwen, a Canadian, qualified in class "B2" and will train with members of the Forestry Depot.

Thirty-four in Class "A2." Fifteen men of the 24 examined by No. 2 board, under the presidency of Major G. H. Cruikshank, were in class "A2" men, one was a class "B2" and one a class "C." Seven were rejected. Today the new medical board, headed by J. R. LeToussell, A.M.C. Training Depot, is now president of No. 1 board. C. E. McEwen and Capt. J. A. McEwen being the other members. Capt. P. H. Sutherland, A.M.C. Training Depot No. 1, is the president of No. 2 board, with Lieut. G. R. Sykes and Dr. J. Ferguson as members.

Major H. Irvine remains here as officer in charge of mobilization.

'TEEN AGE GIRLS' ORGANIZATION IS BEING ADVANCED
