After getting this information, his name is forwarded to Ottawa accompanied with a recommendation for him to attend a course of a specified duration, during which the vocation he has chosen may be learned." wocation he has chosen may be learned.

Mr. Beal stated that some returned men who had formerly been university students before enlistment, had been sent to Toronto and other educational centres to complete the course which their enlistment had temporarily discontinued. An instance of the system followed by the vocational training officials, in recommending certein returned soldiers to receive a particular kind of tuition, is given by Mr. Beal. 
