PROVISIONS FOR GERMANY

Washington. Nov. 12.—Amendments of the armistice terms made by Marshal Foch after his first meeting with the German plenspotentiaries, as announced tonight by the state department, include the delivery to the United States and the Allies of all of Germany's submarines, instead of the 180 specified in the original draft of the armistice. the original draft of the armistice.

The bullet hit Blaine near the heart. Arnold fired twice more, and Blaine attempted to enter the house with his hands above his head. He examined Blaine's body, and said: "I guess I killed him; I am an expert rifle shot." He then ordered shot."
