U.S. PRESIDENT PROMISES TO SEND FOOD TO GERMANY

ALLIED HIGH COMMAND DECLINES TO MODIFY ARMISTICE TERMS

AMERICAN GOVERNMENT HAS RECEIVED NO CONFIRMATION OF REPORTED ASSASSINATION OF GERMAN CROWN PRINCE

Dispatches From Dutch Source Tell of ex-Kaiser's Eldest Son's Death and of His Arrival at Maastricht.

Washington, Nov. 13.—It was officially stated today that the American Government has no confirmation of rumors that the former German crown prince has been killed.

ARRIVES AT MAASTRICHT.

London, Nov. 13.—The former German crown prince arrived yesterday at Maastricht, according to a dispatch received here.

London, Nov. 12.—The crown prince, Frederick William of Germany, was shot and killed on Monday morning by German soldiers when trying to cross the Dutch frontier, according to Amsterdam dispatches to the Times and the Post.

ALL GERMANY'S SUBS ARE TO BE DELIVERED TO THE ALLIES

Amendments to the Original Armistice Draft Made By Foch.

PROVISIONS FOR GERMANY

Troops of Occupation to Administer Countries on Left Bank of Rhine.

Washington, Nov. 12.—Amendments to the armistice terms made by Marshal Foch after his first meeting with the German plenipotentiaries, as announced tonight by the state department, include the delivery to the United States and the Allies of all of Germany's submarines, instead of the 60 specified in the original draft of the armistice.

GERMAN STOCK LOW?

Reduction in the amount of certain military equipment to be delivered by the Germans to the allied governments, including 25,000 instead of 30,000 machine guns, and 1,700 airplanes instead of 2,000.

PACHITCH TO PRESIDE.

Berlin, Nov. 12.—It is announced that Nikola B. Pachitch, president of the Council of Serbia, will preside at the Geneva Congress, which will decide upon the details for constituting a state including the Jugo Slav nationalities in Serbia.

VICTORY LOAN TOTAL IS NOW \$376,545,700

Over Half the Amount Has Been Subscribed In Ontario.

HOLLAND IS TO ALLOW FORMER KAISER TO STAY

Ex-Head of German Empire Takes Name of Count Hohenzollern.

ARRIVED MONDAY AFTERNOON.

Amsterdam, Nov. 12.—By the Associated Press.—William Hohenzollern, former emperor, arrived Monday afternoon at the castle of Amersfoort, Count von Bentinck's country seat at Maarn, in the province of Utrecht.

London, Nov. 13.—Holland will permit William Hohenzollern to remain on Dutch soil on the same terms of internment as other high officers of the German army. He has taken the name of Count William Hohenzollern, and is expected to buy an estate and remain in Holland, according to an Amsterdam dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph Company.

AGED GENERALS WENT AWAY WITH EX-KAISER.

Amsterdam, Nov. 12.—A few aged generals accompanied Wm. Hohenzollern in his flight to Holland. When they reached the frontier they were stopped by Dutch frontier guards, who sent for service and some local authorities. After being introduced to the former emperor, Gen. von der Goltz entered the automobile, which had crossed the frontier, and drove off. The bystanders hissed the former German emperor. One of the generals in the party was in tears when the group drove away.

GERMAN GARRISON IN BRUSSELS RISES AGAINST OFFICERS

Several Killed, According to Report of Neutrals.

British Headquarters in Flanders, Nov. 13.—The German garrison in Brussels has revolted against the non-commissioned officers, according to neutrals reaching the British lines from Brussels. Several of the officers were killed.

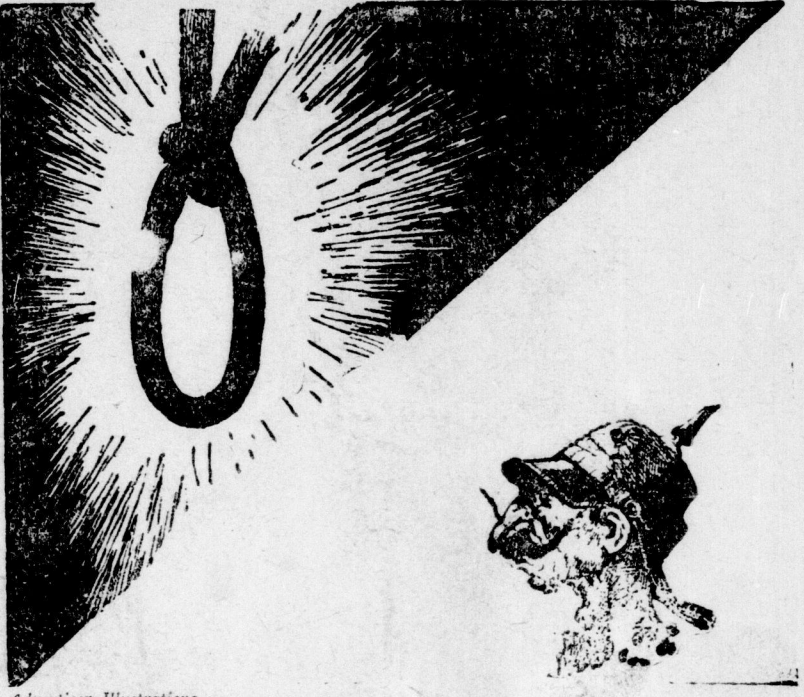

ARMISTICE TERMS NOT TO BE MODIFIED, IS THE ALLIES' ANSWER TO THE GERMANS

Allied High Command Sends Reply to Request of Teutons For Relaxation of the Truce Conditions.

London, Nov. 13.—The Allied high command has sent to the German high command by French wireless a message that there can be no modifications of the conditions of the armistice, including the annexes, at this time. It is added that a supplementary period of 24 hours for the evacuation of Belgium, Luxembourg and Alsace-Lorraine has been added to the fourteen days stipulated in the original text, so as to permit the text of the German headquarters at the desired time.

IMPERIAL WAR CABINET WILL RESUME SITTINGS

Will Discuss Peace Terms At An Early Date.

London, Nov. 13.—Reuter's Agency learns that the Imperial war cabinet will shortly resume its sittings in order to deliberate on the terms of peace. There will be also important conference and discussions in London between the Imperial and Dominion statesmen.

SWEDEN MAY BE NEXT TO REVOLT AND FORM REPUBLIC

Socialists There Urge General Change In Conditions.

London, Nov. 12.—The revolution in Germany has made an impression in Sweden, where organs of the Independent Socialists publish a manifesto urging the establishment of soldiers and workmen's councils everywhere in order to establish a Socialist government and a republic, according to Copenhagen advices to the Exchange Telegraph Company. General demobilization of the armies and an eight-hour working day are also demanded.

FAMINE WILL BE AVERTED IN GERMANY BY SUPPLIES OF FOOD THAT PRESIDENT WILSON PROMISES TO SEND

KING ALBERT TO RETURN TO BRUSSELS ON FRIDAY NEXT

Germans Have Begun Evacuation of Belgium's Capital.

Paris, Nov. 13.—The Germans have begun the evacuation of Brussels. A Dunkirk dispatch to the Paris edition of the New York Herald says that King Albert and his family probably will re-enter Brussels next Friday.

BAVARIAN GOVT. FEARS STRANGLE HOLD OF ALLIES

Appeals to Wilson to Loosen Grip, or Republic May Be Doomed.

Copenhagen, Nov. 12.—The new Bavarian Government has sent a message to President Wilson through Switzerland, expressing its fears that the armistice terms will bring chaos to the disordered young republic and requesting that Great Britain, France and Italy be asked to punish the guilty. The message adds that the German autocracy and military party do not deserve mercy.

HOLLAND WILL CARRY ON WORK OF REPATRIATION

Consents to Assume Control of Release of Allied Prisoners in Germany.

Paris, Nov. 13.—Holland has consented to carry on the work of repatriating Allied prisoners of war now held in Germany.

EX-KAISER WILL BE GIVEN CERTAIN DEGREE OF LIBERTY

Officers of William Hohenzollern Will Be Interned In Holland.

Amsterdam, Nov. 13.—According to Eysden advices, the German officers with William Hohenzollern will be interned at Amersfoort. The ex-emperor will not be asked to give his parole, but it will be silently assumed that he is under a moral obligation. Some measure of freedom will be permitted him.

PRINCE LEOPOLD IS REPORTED TO HAVE RENOUNCED THRONE

Berne, Switzerland, Nov. 13.—Prince Leopold Lippe-Deimold renounced his throne on Tuesday, according to the semi-official Wolff Bureau of Berlin.

Head of U.S. Government Sends Reply To Chancellor Ebert Whose Appeal Outlined Fearful Conditions in Germany.

Washington, Nov. 13.—President Wilson has sent a reassuring message to the people of Germany in reply to the appeal from Chancellor Ebert. He promises to aid Germany in the matter of food supplies and in relieving distressing want.

The reply was sent today by Secretary Lansing through Minister Sulzer of Switzerland, who delivered yesterday Ebert's request for intervention by the president to mitigate the "fearful conditions" threatened through enforcement of the armistice terms.

It says steps are to be taken at once to organize relief work in the same systematic manner it was carried out in Belgium, but that the president desires to be assured that public order will be maintained in Germany and that an equitable distribution of food can be clearly guaranteed.

TEXT OF LANSING'S NOTE.

Secretary Lansing's note to the Swiss minister, dated November 12, follows: "I have the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your note of today transmitting to the president the text of a cable inquiring whether this Government is ready to send foodstuffs into Germany without delay if public order is maintained and an equitable distribution of food is guaranteed. "I should be grateful if you would transmit the following reply to the German Government: "At a joint session of the two houses of congress on November 11, the President of the United States announced that the representatives of the associated governments in the supreme council of Versailles have by unanimous resolution assured the peoples of the central empires that everything that is possible in the circumstances will be done to supply them with food and relieve their distressing want that is in so many places threatening their very lives, and that steps are to be taken immediately to organize the efforts at relief in the same systematic manner that they were organized in the case of Belgium. "Furthermore, the president expressed the optimistic use of the foodstuffs of the central empires it ought presently to be possible to lift the fear of utter misery from their oppressed populations and set their minds and energies free for the great and hazardous tasks of political reconstruction which now faces them on every hand. "Accordingly the president now directs me to state that he is ready to consider favorably the supplying of foodstuffs to Germany and to lay up the matter immediately with the Allied governments, provided he can be assured that public order is being and will continue to be maintained in Germany, and that an equitable distribution of food can be clearly guaranteed. "I signed, JOSEPH LANSING. "Sulzer's Message. "This message was sent in response to the following message from Minister Sulzer: "By direction of the Government, I have the honor to transmit the following cable: "The German Government urgently requests the president of the United States to inform the German Chancellor Ebert by wireless whether he may be assured that the Government of the United States is ready to send foodstuffs without delay if public order is maintained in Germany and an equitable distribution of food is guaranteed. "Accept, sir, the renewed assurance of my highest consideration."

EX-GERMAN ARMY OFFICER KILLS VICTORY LOAN WORKER

Tip Blaine of Drumheller, Alta., Murdered by Albert Arnold, a Farmer, Who Is Reported To Have Been Sullen As a Result of Germany's Defeat.

Winnipeg, Nov. 12.—Tip Blaine of Drumheller, Alta., a Victory Loan worker, was shot and killed tonight by Albert Arnold, an ex-lieutenant in the German army. Blaine, with some other men, went to Arnold's farmhouse, and said: "I guess I killed him; I put his foot inside, Arnold shot, and yelled: "Do not come in; I am an expert shot." The bullet hit Blaine near the heart. Arnold fired twice more, and Blaine dropped dead. The rest of his companions scattered.

GERMAN-AUSTRIA PROCLAIMED PART OF THE REPUBLIC

Copenhagen, Tuesday, Nov. 12.—German Austria has been proclaimed a part of the German republic by the state council, says a dispatch from Vienna.

FRENCH WAR OFFICE TO DISCONTINUE THE OFFICIAL STATEMENTS

Events of Troop Movements in Occupied Districts May Be Chronicled.

Paris, Nov. 12.—It was stated at the war office today that no further official reports regarding the movement of the troops in occupied districts west of the Rhine.

CHILEAN MINISTRY RESIGNS.

Santiago, Chile, Nov. 12.—The Chilean ministry resigned today.

GETTINJE LIBERATED BY SERBIAN TROOPS

Guns and Materials Taken in Capture of Montenegro's Capital.

London, Nov. 13.—Gettinja, capital of Montenegro, has been liberated, says a Serbian official statement issued on Tuesday.

On Sunday Serbian troops entered the town of Versec, in Hungary, 25 miles north of the Danube, dispersing and capturing elements of German rear-guards. A number of guns and war material were captured. The Serbians also entered Novisad.

HEAVY EARTHQUAKE SHOCKS.

Rome, Nov. 11.—Heavy earthquake shocks, accompanied by property damage and loss of life occurred in the provinces of Florence and Forli. The villages of Santa Sofia, Bagno di Romagna and Morvico particularly suffered. A Santa Sofia church collapsed, eight persons being killed and several injured.
