

LLOYD GEORGE FAVORS OPENING NEGOTIATIONS WITH BOLSHEVIKI THROUGH MAXIM LITVINOFF

British Premier Is Supported by Head of Italian Government—Members of French Delegation At Meeting of the Supreme Allied Council in London Had No Authority To Enter Into Such a Proposal.

Paris, Feb. 20.—Premier Lloyd George is in favor of opening peace negotiations with Russia through Maxim Litvinoff, Bolshevik representative in Copenhagen, and is supported by Premier Nitti of Italy, according to the Echo de Paris. Paul Cambon at Philippe J. L. Berthelot, members of the French delegation at the meeting of the supreme Allied council in London, have no authority to enter into such a proposal, and Premier Millerand has been recalled to London.
