Ottawa, Feb. 20.—The general impression that the cost of living is climbing higher every day is confirmed in statistics published in the Labor Gazette for February. Grains, flour, bread, meats, live stock, potatoes, fish, textiles, hides, metals, lumber, and raw furs are specifically mentioned in the Gazette as more expensive today than they were on December 31 last.

The cost of a food budget for the average family is shown at \$15.30 a week, compared with \$14.73 in December last, \$13.78 in January, 1919, and \$7.73 in January, 1914.

WILHELM MUST MAKE PROMISE TO SETTLE DOWN AND BE GOOD

The Hague, Feb. 20 .- Before answering the last allied note relative to the extradition of former Emperor William, the Dutch Government is expected to assure itself that the erstwhile monarch is willing to settle down for life at Ioorn, and not disturb the world's peace. While, on answering the original demand for extradition, the Dutch Government acted without consulting Count Hohenzollern in any way, a different course may be pursued in the present instance. ferent course may be pursued in the present instance.

Holland will undoubtedly reply that she is willing to guard William of Hohenzollern closely at Doorn, and accept responsibility for preventing any danger to the world peace, but it will probably be necessary to consult the exile before replying.

No difficulty is anticipated in this connection, as Count Hohenzollern is reported to be ready to accept Doorn as a haven for the rest of his life.

Rear-Admiral Robert E. Peary Dies At His Home in Washington.

ILL FOR TWO YEARS

Thirty-Five Transfusions of Blood Failed To Save His Life.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 20 .- Rear-Admiral Robert Edwin Peary, retired, Arctic explorer, and discoverer of the North Pole, died at his home here to-day from pernicious anaemia, from which he had suffered for several years.
