SETTLEMENT HOPED FOR IN L. AND P. S. STRIKE DISPUTE

Possibility of Increased Rates Is Discussed.

In the opinion of some of the members of the London and Port Stanley commission and of the officials of the employees' organization, something will be done by the commission to discover some way, in which increased revenue can be secured, so that the wage problem on the L. and P. S. R. may be amicably settled.

It was thought by one of the directors this morning, that the men must have misunderstood the proposed arrangement last night under which the men were to go back to work until some arrangement could be made. The commission, he said, would have done its best to find a way of increasing the wages by increasing the rates or by some other method. If the men were

not satisfied with what was accomplished nothing could prevent them from stopping work again. The idea that they would be bound for a year if they went back was entirely erroneous in his opinion.

According to Philip Pocock the commission would undoubtedly strive hard to hold fast to gain what they believe is right, said an official of the union. It is for that reason the men did not go back to work this morning. He thought that the commission would find a way to meet the demands. He said a settlement was reached by the end of the week.

The meeting of the men is to be held this afternoon, although nothing starting is expected to develop. The international representative of the union left for Hamilton at noon. The two-hour service is being operated on the road without interruptions.

quarantined was in a jail at the time. The public health act does not forbid the wearing of the mask which they objected to on the ground that it was unjust to the small theatre operator. Ten reels a day is the average number of reels shown. Nine dollars a week is nothing more or less to a big show house, but it's a little title for the theatre with 300 seats. So the big theatre men stood by the little fellows and wouldn't show Government publicity until they were assured the tax would be lifted.

Look for Less Trade. The sporting goods dealers look for a falling off in higher-priced trade. The jewelry trade is in doubt whether all diamonds are jewelry are to be taxed, or only diamonds over \$500 in value. "It won't be such a bad thing," said John A. Nash. "Already it's got people looking at diamonds and sales have been increased this morning. People will buy quality instead of size. They won't buy a flashy diamond that looks big enough for \$500, rather than a better but smaller stone, because they know they have to show the Government that they didn't pay \$500 for it."

A Wolf, wholesale tobacconist, objected to the 1 per cent addition to all invoices. It means a lot of extra work, and will work out at a combined tax of 2 or 3 or more per cent. One per cent for the manufacturer, 1 per cent for the wholesaler, 1 per cent for the dealer, etc., means 3 or 4 per cent that the retailer has to pay. He can't collect a full extra cent on a cent purchase of tobacco, so the retailer will lose on small tobacco sales.

"Lots of work for poor Government officials," said a business man, "and no business was not affected, but realized the difficulty of checking up on sales in half the retail stores in town."

A lot of doubt exists as to whether sales should be made today with the tax added to the purchaser. In most stores, this being a half-holiday, the matter was left to the discretion of the manager. A few stores took the tax, but the majority of purchasers slow to choose articles on which a tax may be payable.

As far as is known by Government tax officials here, all luxury taxes will have to be paid to the department of inland revenue here, as has been the custom in the case of taxing automobiles.
