

CITY'S POWER SCHEDULE
MEANS LOWER PRICES

Manufacturers Will Undoubtedly Benefit by the Rates the City Offers.

General satisfaction will be felt with the figures made public by the city. Various prices have been estimated for electric power under the Hydro-Electric Power Commission scheme, and the enemies of the project have declared that nothing under \$50 per horsepower per year was possible.

The table of prices endorsed by the board of control for large users of power presents lower figures than have been anticipated by the power commission itself.

It has been the boast of the Toronto Electric Light Company and its officials that the whole Hydro-Electric scheme was a misguided delusion which could never be brought to completion, and that the prices indicated were absurd. Their own prices, ranging from \$50 to \$90 a horsepower a year and upwards, were declared to be the cheapest that could be given and lower than anything the city could offer.

Argument was of no avail. The electric light company had practical experts and experience, and they knew their knowledge has undergone a sudden revision since the publication of the city tariff. The public is now informed that the company can meet these prices better than them. How Adam Beck! And how intelligible the opposition of the last year in the light of the new schedule!

The schedule explained. The prices offered by the schedule are not too easily understood by the ordinary man.

The first column merely indicates the probable amount of power a customer thinks he may use. He enters himself in the 200, the 100, or the 200 horsepower class, as the case may be. He must pay according to the second column at least the amount set for 200 horsepower. These amounts cover approximately half the quantity of power for which he contracts. Should he contract for 200 horsepower he may agree to pay the flat rate or the meter rate given in either of the other columns. Suppose he takes the meter rate and only uses 100 horsepower instead of the 200 contracted for, he pays the minimum monthly amount set for 200 horsepower, or \$34. Should he use 250 horsepower, he would then pay according to his meter register.

During the first year, if he finds he has been in error in estimating the amount of power he expected to use, he will have the option of changing his class. Afterwards he may change his class annually. Contracts are for five years. The customer must look ahead in judging his class.

The 24-hour customer will naturally take the flat rate. The customer who uses power 8 or 10 hours a day only would get the \$12.25 rate, bringing his power down to \$20.70. This looks like good business.

"Short Time" Rates. The short time user, the man who runs his factory eight or ten hours a day, must expect to pay a little more, especially on account of the "peak load," which occurs when everybody wants power and light in the late winter months.

There are 150 peak hours charged by the city at 6 cents an hour, which means \$9 for 8 hours and \$10 for 10 hours. The public will not be slow in making comparisons.

For 200 horsepower the rate for 8 and 10-hour customers is proportionately favorable at \$21.50 and \$24.50 respectively.

Steam Assistance. The advertisements set forth by the Electric Light Co. on power at peak hours and steam generation of heat is not at all touch the essential point in the matter. The heating is required just at the season when the peak load is most apparent. By utilizing steam when heat is required to run an auxiliary generating plant the peak hours can be cut out entirely.
