TOWNSHIP AND C.P.A. GETTING NEARER

Strenuous Conference on Menday Help Outlook Some-Trouble May Be Solved.

The construction of a 30-foot subway ther 30-foot subway at or near the carlett Plains-road crossing, together with the building of an eight-foot ubway at the Jane-street crossing, all roperly lighted and drained, the latproperly lighted and drained, the latter to remain virtually a York Township road, and the cost of an enlarged subway, if such is ever deemed necessary, to be borne by the municipality, is the understanding practically arrived at between the members of the York Township Council and the C.P.R. representatives on Monday afternoon, it was a long and strenuous session, and the township representatives, with Reeve Henry in charge, practically fought every foot of their way.

For the township, in addition to neeve Henry, were Deputies Watson, Barker and Syme and Councillor Griffith and Assessment, Commissioner Clarke.

For the C.P.R. appeared Superintendent Oborne, Engineer Hertzberg and Solicitor Walker, with Allan Royce acting in an advisory capacity. For nearly two years the Jane, Elizabeth and Scarlett-road crossings have been fruitful sources of contention to the township, in lieu of the level crossings, asking that 30-foot subways be built at the three points named, and it was practically in accordance with the desires of the council that the present plans were drafted. Following the tacit acceptance of the two 30-foot and the one eight-foot subway, residents living north of the Jane-street crossing demanded a driveway of 20 or 30 feet at that point, and this has practically given rise to most of the disagreement.

"I believe it will not be long before we will again be suppliants before you for some concessions," said Superintendent Oborne in the outset, as he unfolded a big map of the proposed West Toronto yards. The yards, as shown, will not long do for a "larger foronto."

Mr. Oborne then reviewed in detail some of the improvements under way, as the Mimico "cut-off," branching from a short distance beyond Islington southerly and tapping the main line running to Hamilton. "We must divert the freight coming in over the Hamilton line to West Toronto to relieve the congestion in the Bathurst-street yards," said he. "We have now a double track to Lambton, and this will be at once extended westerly. We have big plans, and the enlargement of the West Toronto yards is a part of them." Mr. Oborne spoke further with respect to C.P.R. plans.

As a last resort Reeve Henry then submitted a proposition to which the C.P.R. representatives at first demurred, but finally a possible compromise was effected. Reeve Henry's proposal was, in brief to reserve to the municipality the right to demand, if occasion should arise, the widening of the Jane-street subway up to that originally existing, 66 feet. The company's representatives would only concede this point in view of a release from the costs attached, and which may never eventuate.

Altogether, in view of the fact that the company will expend a large sum of money in developing the district and three good subway crossings will be built, obvisting all level crossing risks, coupled with the fact that ex-Reeve George Syme and other representative property owners have endorsed the proposed settlement, the suggested arrangement will in all probability be carried out.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS. A NY person who is the sole head of a a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba. Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres soiely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside upon the homestead or pre-emption six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption may enter for a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$200.00.
