NEW YORK FINANCIAL BUREAU. New York, Oct. 2—The policy of special-ty bullish operations does not seem to be abandoned as yet, and an investigation points to a continuation today of the same. There are more irregular tendencies, how ever, especially in the high priced rail-road issues and the list is approaching a reactionary period, so that we would pre-fer to buy on little recessions rather than to climb for stocks and we would also not neglect fair returns on the bulges.
