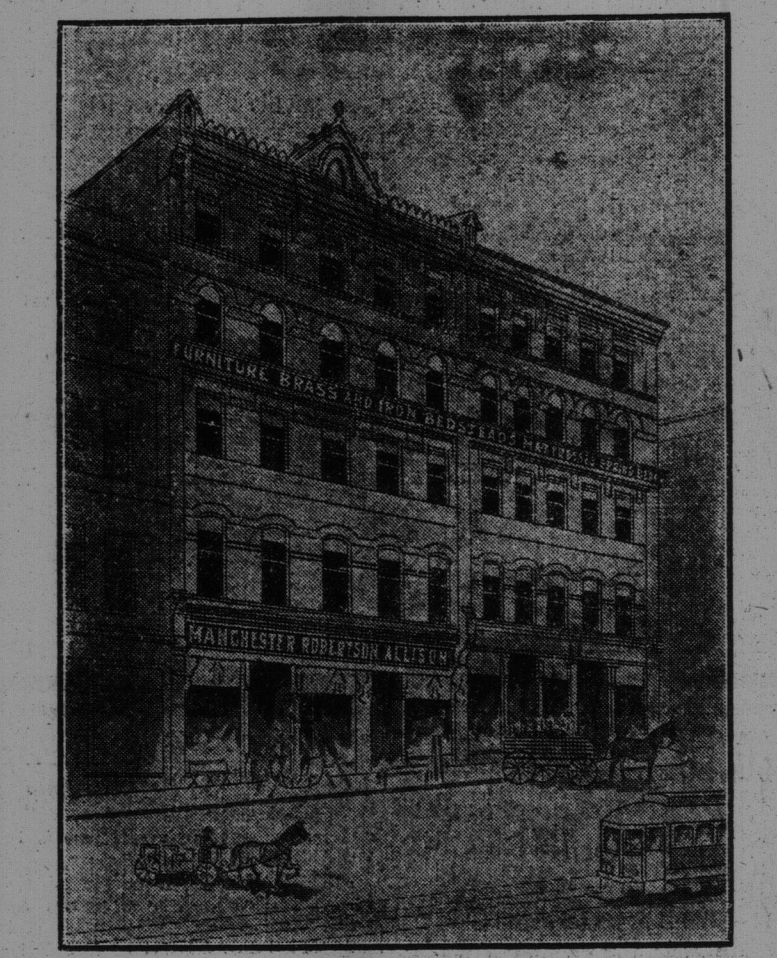

ANOTHER BIG BUILDING ACQUIRED BY M. R. A. LTD.

The McDiarmid Drug Company's Five Story Brick Building on Market Square Will be Home of Part of Manchester's Furniture Department.



Manchester Robertson Allison Ltd., today announced to the Times that they have acquired the large five-story brick building on Market Square, which up to a few weeks ago was occupied by the McDiarmid Drug Company.

The large mercantile house will at once merge these new premises into their present building immediately adjoining. This will afford a larger amount of additional floor space which has been needed for some time in the conducting of M. R. A.'s growing furniture business. The two buildings in the aggregate will make Manchester's furniture department the largest east of Montreal, and one of the largest in Canada.

MR. CUSHING AND HIS JOB

Will He Look Now for Another Position or Will He Remain With the City?

When Director Cushing sent in his application for an increase of salary to the common council, he asked that the matter be dealt with before March 1st, otherwise he would look for another position. No action has been taken yet by the aldermen, so it would appear that the director is free to look around for another position.

Director Cushing, when asked about his application this morning, said it had been laid over until next Tuesday, when it would be taken up and considered along with the estimates for the year.

COUNTY COURT

In the case of D. R. Jack against Leigh B. Freese, the case was previously heard before the Justice of the Peace at Fairville, the case being dismissed.

The case was tried de novo before Judge Forbes this morning and Freese was found guilty, as the things which took place at Duck Cove amounted to an assault, and allowed to go under a suspended sentence. He was warned by the judge to keep away from Mr. Jack's property for at least a year. The judge took occasion to give a severe lecture, not only to Freese, but to some of his companions who were in court as to the propriety of carrying loaded guns, using abusive language and trespassing on other people's property. D. M. Mallin, K. C. appeared for Mr. Jack and J. B. M. Carter for Freese. No costs were allowed to either party.

POLICE COURT

The case against Charles Cochrane, charged with assaulting Edwin Olive on Charlotte St. last night was taken up in the police court this morning. Fred Peck was arrested with Cochrane on the charge of drunkenness.

Officer Marshall said that he had been summoned to Charlotte St. by Dr. Smith, who told him that a man was being beaten further down the street. The officer said that both Peck and Cochrane were drunk when he arrested them. Edwin Olive took the stand and said that he was struck in the face and kicked about the body by Cochrane. Cochrane pleaded not guilty. Doctor Smith's evidence is being taken this afternoon.
