Chicago, Sept. 5.—Ira Barnes confessed today, the police said, that she shot and killed her husband, James R. Barnes, while they were strolling in Washington Park last night. Barnes was estranged from her husband, and the police he had attempted to strangle her and that she fired the shots to save her own life. Three bullets entered his head.

BRITISH OFFICERS IN CASUALTY LIST SO FAR NUMBER 39,722

London, Aug. 25.—(Correspondence.) Casualty lists for the first two weeks of August show that the British army lost 600 officers killed, 1,702 wounded and 234 missing, a total of 2,536. This brings up the losses since the beginning of the war to 86,292 officers of whom 11,442 have been killed or died of wounds, 24,680 wounded and 2,800 are missing. In the fortnight six lieutenant-colonels were killed.
