To I. C. R. Job.

Kenneth J. Storey, a former member of the 26th Battalion, has received a government position and will report for his new duties this morning as store keeper of the I. C. R. Mr. Storey was nine months at the front and, as a result of being wounded, returned home last winter. For a time he has been employed as a recruiting clerk.

Death in 165th.

The first death in the 165th Battalion since it came to St. John occurred yesterday afternoon, when Private Buienne Babineau, of St. Louis, Kent county, died in the military hospital after a severe attack of pneumonia. Private Babineau was a member of "B" company under the command of Major Gallant, and was about twenty-two years of age, and unmarried. His brother is Father A. Babineau, of Acadville, Kent county.

Private Babineau was considered a very promising young soldier, of excellent character and had only been ill a very short time and his death is greatly regretted by each and every member of the unit. The funeral arrangements have not yet been made.

The Berlin war office has officially announced that the Germans have been forced to evacuate Fort Vaux.

The Italians opened a new offensive yesterday against the Austrians. Advances have been made and 2,781 prisoners taken.

A body of 140 Royalist troops have retired from Katerina in Greece before 600 insurgents armed with machine guns.

The king has issued orders that the advance of the revolutionists must be stopped at all costs.

The German-Austrian offensive in Transylvania appears definitely to have reached a standstill.
