Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 80—Although no definite allocation will be made for a while, it is expected that of the extra Bulgaria May Change to Allies'
Side and Greece May Also
Fall Into Line Against the Teutons

New York, Oct. 30—The London correspondent of the New York Herald cables:

"General Joffre came, saw, and conquered England yesterday, for, after a long war council in Downing street, in which Mr. Asquith, Lord Kitchener, Mr. Lloyd George, Mr. Balfour, and several distinguished English and French "enerals took part, I am informed a complete understanding was arrived at." If am in a position to state Serbia will not be abandoned. Though she may suffer temporarily as the result of the treachery of Bulgaria, and the inactive policy of the king of the Hellenes, in the end the allies will rescue her.

"In this connection, I am told, there has been an effective rapprochement between Russian and Roumania; that the Czar, having agreed to consent to a realization of Roumania's national aspirations, including the cession of certain portions of Bessarabia, Russian troops will march through Roumania traticry to succor Serbia, and that, within a short time King Ferdinand's fine army will support the Quadruple Entente.

"Athens despatch indicates that King Constantine realizes the tide is turning toward the allies, and again it would be no surprise if, despite the threats of the Kalser, when Roumania marches Greece will also be found fighting on the side of the allies."




