

ALLIES WILL SAVE SERBIA Favorable Outlook Now In Balkan Fight THE RUSSIANS TO GO THROUGH ROUMANIA

Bulgaria May Change to Allies Side and Greece May Also Fall Into Line Against the Teutons New York, Oct. 30.—The London correspondent of the New York Herald cables: "General Joffre came, saw, and conquered England yesterday, for, after a long war council in Downing street, in which Mr. Asquith, Lord Kitchener, Mr. Lloyd George, Mr. Balfour, and several distinguished English and French generals took part, I am informed a complete understanding was arrived at which will see the Russian and Rumanian troops marching through Rumanian territory to succor Serbia, and that, within a short time King Ferdinand's fine army will support the Quadruple Entente. "Athens despatch indicates that King Constantine realizes the tide is turning toward the allies, and again it would be no surprise if, despite the threats of the Kaiser, when Rumania marches Greece will also be found fighting on the side of the allies." New York, Oct. 30.—A news agency despatch from London says: Despatches from Rome say that definite arrangements have been made for the passage of Russian troops through Rumania and that Rumania soon will be in the war.

The report for work for October by the St. John branch of the Canadian Patriotic Fund, including the city and county of St. John, Kings, Queens, Albert and part of Westmorland follows: Total subscriptions received during October, \$10,516.64. Total disbursed during month, \$11,636.90. Amount paid out for relief, \$1,344.90. Amount paid out for other purposes, \$10,292.00. This includes postage, telephone, stationery and sundries, \$1,344.90. Number of families on roll receiving assistance, 740. Average per family per month, \$14.4. Cost of administration slightly over 1 1/2 per cent. In this latter, I believe, will compare favorably with cost of administration of any of the large philanthropic societies either church or state, and is much below the cost of other offices of the Canadian Patriotic Fund of similar size and importance.

EXPECT NEW BRUNSWICK TO RAISE 4,000 One in Three of British Blood in Canada Between 18 and 35

Ottawa, Ont., Oct. 30.—Although no definite allocation will be made for a while, it is expected that of the extra 78,000 men to be raised for the front, Ontario will contribute 27,000, Manitoba and Saskatchewan 18,000, Alberta 7,000, British Columbia 4,000, Quebec 3,000, Nova Scotia 4,000, New Brunswick 4,000, and Prince Edward Island 1,000. Commanding officers and the senior officers of the new regiments will, so far as possible, be selected from those who have seen active service.

WAR NOTES

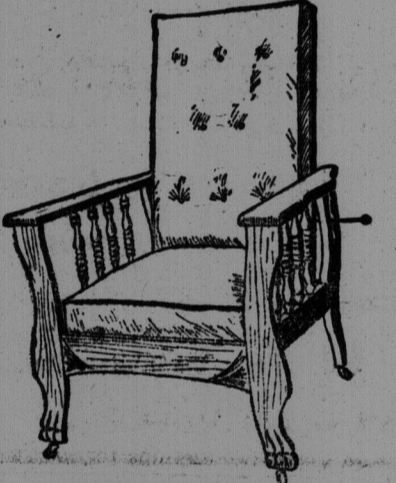
