

CARVELL MEANS TO GIVE FACTS ABOUT RAILWAYS

Increase in Freight Rates Allowed Only Enough to Prevent Roads Failing

Defies Any Criticism of His Publicity Policy — People Have Got to Have Lower Rates, Tells Vancouver Board of Trade.

Determination to continue his campaign of "telling the people the truth about railway problems" was expressed by Hon. F. B. Carvell, M. C., when he addressed a gathering of the members of the Vancouver board of trade this week. About 250 men were present. Carvell is in connection with the siting of the Board of Railway Commissioners, of which he is the chairman.

He urged that the increased freight rates granted to Canadian roads by his board last fall were necessary to prevent the Canadian National Railways going to the wall, and that the Canadian Pacific Railway would have been exhausted in four years by increased cost of maintenance, if increased revenues had not been provided for that road.

The board, he said, could not accept the responsibility for placing the Canadian Pacific Railway on the financial rocks.

Mr. Carvell said that he was not going to discuss the merits of public ownership of railways. He was pretty plainly on record as disapproving of it. "They will get that knocked out of them," he said. "They are finding out that it is going to cost this year at least \$70,000,000 to support this toy." He remarked that if the people, as a whole, wanted to go on paying the maintenance of the government roads out of taxes, he was willing to pay his share. He remarked that some statements he made in Vancouver last Thursday had been challenged. He had now names of stations and of the agents to whom, in the first two months of January last, the C. N. R. had paid sums ranging as high as \$314, on a wage basis of \$130 to \$135 per month. The wage scale, he added, was reasonable. He could not understand, however, when the agents put in hours enough to make the higher sums. But the figures showed that they got them. He commented that the wage scale for other classes of railway workers were reasonable, too. "But it is in the overtime, gentlemen," he added, "where Mr. McAdoo gets his work."

He reiterated that he did not blame the workers for the state of affairs. He hoped that his decision on the matter would start the minds of the people working on the problem, so that a solution would be found. Supplementing his remarks with a discussion of the business outlook of the Pacific coast, and the shipping question, he closed with the optimistic hope that a solution of all these problems would be found in the near future.
