MEMORANDUM DEALING WITH BETTER TERMS

Presented to House—Provincial Secretary and Arch. McDonald Formally Introduced.

Victoria, February 9th.

Upon the retirement of His Honor Sir Hugh Joly de Lothier after formally opening the House to-day prayers were read by Bishop Perrin. The legislature then proceeded with the formal business attending the beginning of the session.

The Speaker formally announced that to prevent mistakes he had obtained a copy of His Honor's speech. The election returns for Kamloops and Lillooet bye-elections were presented to the House.

Hon. F. J. Fulton, for Kamloops, was introduced to the Speaker by Premier McBride and Attorney-General Wilson.

Arch. McDonald, representing Lillooet, was in turn presented by Hon. R. G. Tatlow and Hon. R. F. Green.

On motion of the Premier it was ordered that the select standing committee of the House, for the present session, be appointed for the following purposes:

On public accounts, on printing, on railways, on mining, on agriculture and on municipal matters.

The Premier also introduced formal motions dealing with the printing of the votes and proceedings, and that dealing out dire threats against any person who might have been guilty of bribery or other corrupt practices.

An Act to amend an Act for the Protection of Breeders of Live Stock, was introduced and read a first time, and set down to be read a second time at the next sitting of the House.

On motion of Premier McBride it was resolved, that the speech of His Honor the Lieutenant-Governor should be taken into consideration at the sitting of the House on Monday.

The Premier presented the memorandum of the case of the province for better terms, which urges upon the Dominion government the advisability of a friendly conference or appointment of a commission to go into the subject.

The memorandum is largely the same as that prepared by Geo. Cowan, of Vancouver, who went into the subject last year.

After giving the schedules dealing with the subject, the memorandum sets forth that "These are the grounds, mainly, upon which the government of British Columbia appeal for special consideration to the Dominion authorities."

"(1) Provide by legislation for the payment of any sums which might become payable to stockholders under any judgment in the United Kingdom; (2) Satisfy the treasury that adequate funds (and when required) will be made available in the United Kingdom to meet the claims of stockholders; (3) Place on record a formal expression of their opinion that any of their legislation 'which appears to the Imperial government to alter any of the provisions of the Colonial Stock Act, and their securities have obtained a wider market;

BOUNDARY CAMP IS A REVELATION

RESOURCES AS ONISH FAMOUS ENGINEER Granby Smelter Installing Automatic Feed Devices to Save the Labor of Eighty Men.

Greenwood, Feb. 11.—M. M. Johnston, M. E. of Salt Lake City, left here Thursday after a fortnight's stay, examining the various properties. He formerly had charge of the Highland Boy mine, Gingham, Utah, which sold for \$13,000,000, and had paid nearly \$3,000,000 in dividends. He is greatly impressed with the vast mineral resources of this section, and particularly with the self-fluxing character of the ores, insuring low cost of smelting and the modern methods of mining followed.

To your correspondent he said: "I don't think I am betraying any confidence when I state that I am favorably impressed with the Boundary district. An inspection of the principal mines has proved a perfect revelation to me. The Granby Company certainly possesses the largest open-pit body of ore ever seen. The vastness of the stopes and the millions of tons of ore in sight are well calculated to impress even a veteran engineer unfamiliar with the conditions of this section as a body of ore of such magnitude as to be of great value. The development has been during the past few years, I am credibly informed that this section in a comparative sense has scarcely been scratched.

These seams are being developed by up-to-date, and could not be improved upon. When you can mine ore without timbering, costs are reduced to the minimum. The glory hole system is a waste of money and time. The only reason for its persistence is the little quantity of secondary enrichment which is consistently absent. "Automatic feeding devices for the six furnaces of the Granby smelter have been built by the Union Iron Works, Spokane. They were shipped to Grand Forks last Wednesday. They will displace with the labor of 80 men, effecting a saving in wages of over \$80,000 annually. J. B. McAllister, superintendent of the B. C. Copper Co.'s smelter, left yesterday to confer with the board of directors respecting the installation of four new furnaces in the smelter, giving increased facilities for smelting two thousand tons of ore daily. The proposed furnaces will be of a larger type than those now in operation. The latter will be discarded.

"Eighteen properties in the high grade belt are now in operation. Seven of these are either dividend paying or self-sustaining. The remainder are being started up. The Strathmore, which is practically within the city limits, will ship next week a carload of average value \$140 ton ore.

WILL VICTORIA FAIR BE HELD THIS YEAR?

Views of Members of the Agricultural Association on Suggested Postponement of Exhibition.

(From Friday's Daily.) The public meeting called for Tuesday the 14th inst., for the consideration of the advisability of holding an exhibition in Victoria this year, promises to be of exceptional interest. As previously mentioned in these columns it has been suggested that the fair be postponed in order to allow members of the B. C. Agricultural Association a free hand in assisting the New Westminster society to carry through the Dominion Exposition of 1905 successfully. Of course, while there are many who believe that the proposal should be adopted, quite a number oppose it strenuously.

But the consensus of opinion seems to be that the local show should be declared off. It is pointed out that the matter must be looked at from a broad point of view, and everything possible done by residents of Victoria and other Vancouver Island points to work in conjunction with the Mainland in making the national exhibition a credit to British Columbia.

In all probability there will be a number of Royal City delegates at the forthcoming meeting. They will give an opportunity to set forth their side of the question before a decision is reached. Then, it is understood, those favoring a postponement of the local event will come by the smoke and heat, and Mr. Featherston and his family had barely time to get out of the burning building in safety. 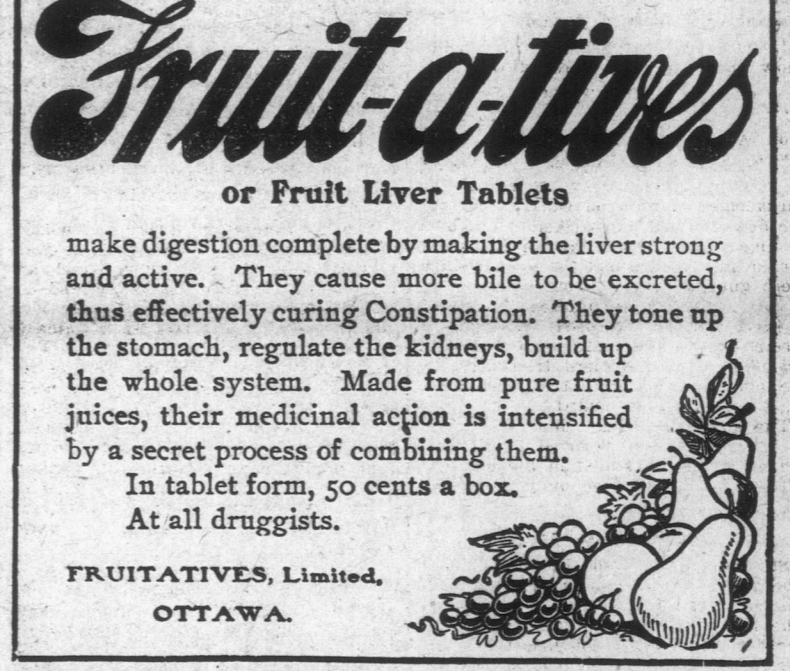

GOVERNMENT DEFEATED. At Fourth Sitting of the Y. M. C. A. Mock Parliament Friday Evening. Friday night the fourth sitting of the Y. M. C. A. mock parliament was held, being a large attendance. After the usual routine business, the committee appointed to investigate the charges of bribery and corruption brought against the government by H. F. Pullen, the opposition leader, was submitted, it completely exonerated Finance Minister Campbell, at whom the charge was directed, from any complicity. Continuing, it referred to various members of the opposition in an improper manner. When a vote was called for on its adoption the House was found to be evenly divided. Speaker Higgins sided with the opposition, explaining that he could not support a party that had so little regard for the dignity of parliament, as was shown by the character of the committee's report. The government, therefore, was defeated.

A debate followed on a memorial to the Dominion government regarding the withdrawal of all sidings from the coast, introduced by Premier Nelson. Messrs. Clement, Marchant, Pullen, Ritchie, Major and Ashton were among those who participated in the discussion.
