matters being omitted: McCormick BAY, GREENLAND,) July 30, 1891. \ Dear Mother: Here I am, ashore in Greenland again, seated in my little tent, verlooking the bay and superintending the construction of our home. I wish you could view the scene. The water of the bay before me is smooth as glass. Cakes of ice and cebergs dot the surface, and across the bay rise grand cliffs and mountains, brown or black or purple with the varying lights and shadows. Above some of them can be seen the ice cap, smooth and white as polished marble, and deep gorges and valleys between them, purple with warm shadows.
