

OMAHA, Neb., Sept. 24—Yesterday was a busy day for the police on account of the street car strike. Rjot call came from almost all parts of the city, there being several such calls within an hour yesterday afternoon. Notwithstanding the activity of the police not over half a dozen arrests were made, although a dozen cars were stoned and several members of their crews were more or less injured.

Car service was stopped at 7 o'clock last night to avoid anticipated trouble. At the headquarters of the street rall-way it was stated that a number of the old men have made application for re-instatement.
