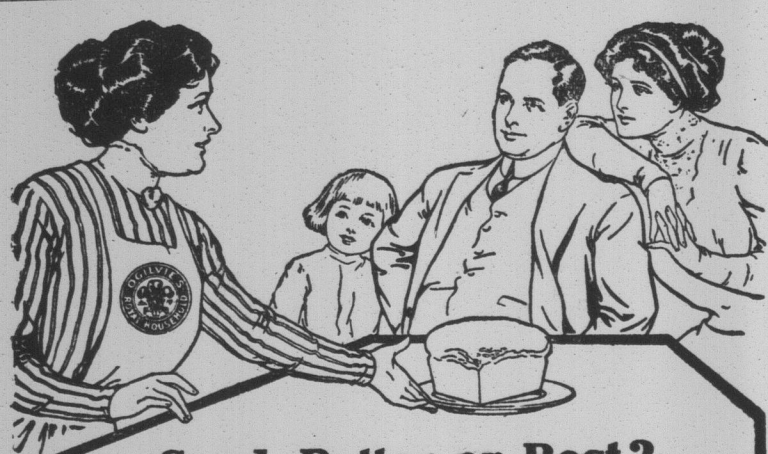

Some idea of the different nationalities that go to make a single parish in the West may be had from the following census taken in St. Augustine's parish, Brandon, Man. The entire parish comprises a membership of about 1,400 souls divided as given below: English-speaking families, 70; German, 30; French, 10; Polish, 60; Ruthenian, 50; Polish and Ruthenian mixed, 55.

Queen Alexandra paid her first private visit after going to Sandringham to the Countess of Strafford, formerly Mrs. Samuel Colgate of New York. She arrived in time for luncheon and had along her nephew, Prince Christopher of Greece, her favorite among the younger members of her family. The Countess rents Houghton Hall, about thirty miles from Sandringham. It is rich in historic associations and is one of the finest mansions in England.

The name they bestowed upon her "Ga-Sar-Navh-We," says the Times, means "one who carries the names and traditions to others." Four of the largest lumber companies in British Columbia have been emerged by a deal just completed. The new corporation which will be known as the Canadian Pacific Lumber Company, of Port Moody, the Barkley Sound Cedar Company of Port Alberni; the Anglo-American Lumber Company, Vancouver, and the Gibbons Lumber Mills, Arrow Lakes. The timber holdings which have been merged approximate 135 square miles of valuable limits, and the total capacity of the four mills at present is about 300,000 feet for a working day of ten hours.

With the view of tracing the flight of shells during night firing, the British military authorities have tested a new invention with 12 pounder guns from Fort Albert, Isle of Wight. It consists of a metal cylinder which is screwed to the base of the shell, and contains some powerful illuminant. This is fired by the explosion, and continues to burn brightly during the flight of the missile. The invention is said to have proved very satisfactory, and is likely to be of great use in correcting ranges.

The very enterprising city of Los Angeles, in California, is to have a home for young women, to be built by Mr. Wm. Clark, a copper magnate, formerly United States senator, as a memorial to his mother, Mary Andrews Clark. The home will cost \$500,000. A site has been bought and ground will be broken this month. Mr. Clark's plan is to provide a home for young working women, especially those employed in department stores and offices, who will be required to pay a moderate weekly rental for apartments.
