News in Brief

KILLED, MANY HURT WHEN TRUCK MISSES CURVE

TRACY, N. B. 13. - Disaster visited this quiet Sunbury countryside with devastating swiftness shortly before noon today when a truck containing a party of 22 berry pickers upset on a sharp turn at Yoho Crossing, a junction four miles from here on the Fredericton highway with the result that two are dead, seven injured from minor cuts and bruises, are critically injured and 14 are suffering from shock.

Some 55 per cent of all sales by drygoods concerns represents purchases by the women for their own use, including ready-to-wear garments, piece goods, lingerie, silk hose and other forms of feminine wear. Children's clothing and outfits make up per cent of the total, while linens, drapery and other household furnishings account for 18 per cent. With 3 per cent for miscellaneous, only 17 per cent of the dry goods volume could be attributed to the men's line, etc.

Construction Work On N. B. Highways About Completed

Very Few Projects Now Underway and General Condition of Highways is Reported Good in Latest Highway Bulletin.

Fredericton, N. B. 15. - Construction work on New Brunswick highways has been completed in many sections of the province and practically all projects underway are nearing completion, according to Highway Bulletin issued today.

The general condition of the highways of the province is good and the maintenance and patrol crews are keeping the surface in splendid shape for traffic.

The detailed bulletin follows: Construction work is still under way at the following points:

- Route No. 1 - Mile 58.1 - Over Brook Bridge under construction. Route No. 2 - Mile 44.0-49.0 above Grand Falls, graveling. Mile 73.5-77.0 three miles below Perth being ditched and gravelled. Mile 96.0-96.5 Bristol Street being widened. Mile 97.0-97.5 Widening and graveling. Mile 129.5-131.0 above Medicine, widening ditching and graveling. Mile 170.0 above McGinley Ferry, Sherrill Hill being constructed. Mile 183.0 Driscoll Brook Bridge under construction. Route No. 3 - Mile 29.0-39.4 near Brookway under construction. Route No. 8 - Mile 12.0-19.0 Durham Bridge to Dunbar Brook, surfacing. Route No. 11 - Mile 47.7 Louison Creek Bridge under construction. Detour to left. Mile 118.8-116.2 Upper Caraque, under construction. Mile 171.2-172.7 New Jersey, under construction.
