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IMPROVING

Washington, Oct. 9.—Crop condi-
tions in the United States are slight-
ly more favorable than the average
conditions for the last ten years ex-
tended during the month of September
according to reports compiled by the
department of agriculture.

On October 1, crop conditions were
15 lower than on that date in 1908,
and 24 per cent lower than last ten
years average condition on the same
date.

The condition of crop in comparison
with the ten year average condition
on October 1 which is represented by
100, was: Potatoes 103.3; tobacco
98.8; barleymalt 94.5; corn 83.2; cot-
ton 98.3; apples 101.1.

The yield per acre of crops which
have so reported, compared with the
ten year average were:

Winter wheat 115.4; spring wheat
117.6; oats 118.2; barley 92.6; rice
110.2; hay 98.6; hops 92.8.

Northcliffe's Model
Colony Launched

Opening of Paper Industry in
Newfoundland Was the Sub-
ject of Unique Celebration—
A Distinguished Gathering.

Grand Falls, Nfld., Oct. 8.—An ev-
ent which in the opinion of the resi-
dents of the town of Grand Falls has
been the most important in the history
of the colony, was celebrated to-
day in the first of two days' festi-
vities in connection with the
formal opening of the Northcliffe
paper and pulp industries here. Al-
though a corporation known as the
Northcliffe Newfoundland Develop-
ment Co. is in charge of the enterprise,
the leading spirit is Lord Northcliffe,
the proprietor of the London Daily Mail,
and monthly publications.

In the development of pulpwood
and paper enterprise here Lord North-
cliffe's company has spent more than
six million dollars and has established
a plant that is exceeded in size only
by the paper mill at Millinocket, Me.

The new town of Grand Falls has
sprung up in a wilderness in the cen-
tre of Newfoundland. It is situated
on the Exploits river, a stream which
has its source in a chain of lakes
in the northwestern part of the
colony and flows in a northerly di-
rection emptying into Notre Dame
Bay. On the northeast coast at a
point where the river is only a few
miles from the ocean, the great mill
has been erected. The task of damming
the river was an engineering problem
of the highest order. It required a
great expense and an immense water
power developed.

Have Spent Much.

Work was then begun on the erec-
tion of a series of mill buildings.
These are now completed and are
equipped with all the modern ma-
chinery. Hundreds of men will be em-
ployed in the mills, while thousands
of lumbermen will find work in the
forests of the colony. The new town
owned by Lord Northcliffe and his
associates. They house these men
and their families, comfortable and at-
tractive dwellings have been built.
Churches, schools and a library are
under construction. A hotel has been
erected and a municipal water and
sewerage system is in operation. It is
understood that the pulp and paper
produced there will all be used by
Lord Northcliffe in furnishing paper
stock for his many publications.

Lord and Lady Northcliffe and a
party of distinguished English and
Newfoundland persons came here to-
day for the formal opening of the
town.
