1891--Gov. Merriam of Minnesota called out troops to prevent the scheduled fight between Bob Fitzsimmons and Jim Hall at Minneapolis. The bout was for the middleweight title and \$12,000. The fans were so disappointed at the calling off of the bout that they started to "rook" and had to be quelled by the militia. Fitz was furious, alleging that Hall had "crawled out" of the arena. The Australian visitor met in New Orleans in 1883, and Hall was knocked out in the fourth round.

CHAIRMAN FARRELL GIVES ORDERS

Chairman John H. Farrell of the National Board of Arbitration governing minor league baseball, today gave out the following orders relative to the sale and trading of players among major and minor leagues: "All optional agreements must be exercised on or before August 15th. The sale of the release of players within twenty days of the commencement of the major league drafting period of within twenty days of the close of the season of the club disposing of the player, is prohibited. The sale of a player's release by one national association to another shall be null and void against the selection by draft of the player by a major league club from the selling club, unless he be in the active service of the purchasing club for twenty days before the opening of the drafting season for major league clubs."

A HEAVY FINE FOR TORONTOS


Toronto, July 21.--President Quinn of the Dominion Lacrosse Association, makes the following verdict on the Tecumseh-Toronto fiasco at Scarborough Saturday: "I will award an official protest from the Tecumseh club after which I will take action as follows: "The Torontos will be suspended and fined five hundred dollars. They will have fifteen days in which to pay their fine and keep their franchise. If they do not decide to pay the league will be finished with the remaining teams. Should Toronto pay their fine, they will again be entitled to fill their obligations with other clubs, which includes another game at the Island which they must either play or the same proceedings will be put into effect again."

Jim Hall, in his prime one of the greatest of the middleweights, was born in Sydney, Australia, forty-five years ago today, July 22, 1868. He died a few months ago at Stevens Point, Wis. Tuberculosis caused his death, just as it had carried away that other great middleweight, Jack Dempsey, and poor old Joe (Gans). The game Australian, who once defeated Bob Fitzsimmons, but was later knocked out by him, began life as a plasterer. His first important battle afterwards declared that he had thrown the fight for \$75, but Hall always denied that it was a fake. When Fitz came to America and defeated Jack Dempsey, a hurry-up call was sent to Hall. The ex-plasterer had the backing of Sports Kingsdon and Charley Mitchell, the English sportsman, and Charley Mitchell, the English heavyweight. The Crescent A. C. of New Orleans, La., was his promoter.



To the Editor of The Standard: There was interest in his last resting place of Sydney Fulton, who on Tuesday gave his life in a brave rescue of nobles and a drowning. Might not be done by the citizens of recognize the moral worth of his heroic deed? A costly monument at King Square to commemorate such an act of nobles and doubt there are many of whose lives give evidence of heroism by their loving and self-sacrificing lives. Remembered, yet it seems young Fulton's attempt of his companion could be some special recognition of the citizens of St. John.
