ST. CROIX TRIMMED GREEKS--  
RAIN PREVENTS F'ON GAME

ST. CROIX, 4; MARATHONS, 1.

The inability of the Marathons to hit Lee, the St. Croix pitcher, and the manner in which the visitors got to Tarbell, resulted in the visitors winning from the Marathons by a score of four to one yesterday afternoon on the North End grounds. It was a good game of ball from start to finish, there being only one error aside and these were fumbles by Waterhouse and Pease.

With two men out in the first inning the bases were filled by St. Croix and it looked as if they were going to score but Vance struck out and retired the side.

With one out in the second Watt hit to left field for two bases and went to third on a wild pitch. The Greeks hoped for a run, but Watt died on the third sack as the next two men hit out to the infield.

Parker opened the third for St. Croix with a two bagger to center field. Lynch sacrificed; Pease fouled out to first; Tetreault singled to left and scored; Parker, Jacobson struck out and retired the side.

Riley managed to reach third in this inning only to die there when the next three men to bat were easy outs.

The first three St. Croix men up in the fourth retired in order while the Marathons in their half of this inning managed to make a run and tie the score. Shanky singled to left; Black sacrificed; Watt flied out to pitcher. Ben drew a base on balls. A pass ball put Shanky on third and he scored when Waterhouse singled to left field. Riley flied out to right field and retired the side.

St. Croix came over with another run in the fifth inning. Lee beat out a bunt to the pitcher. Parker struck out. Lynch singled to center. Pease hit a fly which Watt dropped in right field and the bases were filled. Tetreault hit to left field, scoring. Lee and Lynch were caught on third. Jacobson struck out. It was sharp ball and no scoring until the last inning when St. Croix added two more runs. With one out, Lee hit to Waterhouse who fumbled the ball long enough to make the batter safe. Parker flied out to center. Lynch came across with a two bagger to center field which scored Lee; an error of O'Brien allowed Lynch to reach the third base. 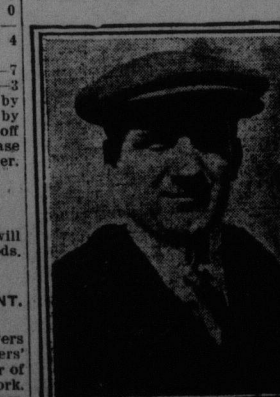

## Jim Hall, in his prime one of the

greatest of the middleweights, was born in Sydney, Australia, forty-five years ago today, July 22, 1868.

Hall died a few months ago at Stevens Point, Wis. Tuberculosis caused his death, just as it had carried away that other great middleweight, Jack Dempsey, and poor old Joe (Gans).

The game Australian, who once defeated Bob Fitzsimmons, but was later knocked out by him, began life as a plasterer. His first important battle afterwards declared that he had thrown the fight for \$75, but Hall always denied that it was a fake.

When Fitz came to America and defeated Jack Dempsey, a hurry-up call was sent to Hall. The ex-plasterer had the backing of Sydney's English sportsman, and Charley Mitchell, the English heavyweight.

hung up forty thousand dollars for the bout, to be divided thirty-five thousand to the winner and five thousand to the loser. Hall was the favorite, and had the benefit of such expert advisers as Charley Mitchell and Jack McCalliffe. Nevertheless he was defeated, Fitz knocking him out in the fourth. Incidentally, Bob got only five thousand of the money coming to him.

Hall was never the same after his defeat by Fitz. The spirit was taken out of him, and although he fought many more battles, he never had another chance to get the title that had seemed so certainly his.

He lived a gay life while his money lasted, and when the white plague got him he was broke. Old time sporting friends, when they heard of his plight, sent him to a sanitarium but his case had progressed too far for medical science to help him.

He was a good old wagon, but done broke down. There's a moral concealed about this story somewhere for those who want to hunt for it.

GIVES ORDERS

Auburn, N. Y., July 21.—Chairman

John H. Farrell, of the National Board of Arbitration governing minor baseball, to day gave out the following orders relative to the sale and trading of players among major and minor leagues:

"All optional agreements must be exercised on or before August 15th.

"The sale of the release of players within twenty days of the commencement of the major league drafting period of within twenty days of the close of the season of the club disposing of the player, is prohibited.

"The sale of a player's release by one national association to another shall be null and void against the selection by draft of the player by a major league club from the selling club, unless he be in the active service of the purchasing club for twenty days before the opening of the drafting season for major league clubs."

## CUBAN PLAYER RELEASED.

Philadelphia, July 21.—Almeida, the Cuban player, who has been with the Cincinnati National League Club for some time, was released this afternoon to the Toronto team of the International League.

## WILL MEET RICHIE'S DEMAND.

Vancouver, July 21.—Vancouver fight promoters will probably meet Willie Ritchie's demand of a guarantee of \$15,000 for a twenty round bout with Freddie Welsh here on Labor Day.

## WILL SEND RIFLE TEAM.

Ottawa, July 21.—Canada is going to send a team for the Palma trophy. This autumn a team of riflemen will go to Ohio and try to take from American riflemen this international trophy. The Canadians succeeded some years ago in capturing it, and brought it back to the Dominion, where it was won the following year by a team of visiting British riflemen who won it from both Canadian and American teams.
