MANY ATTEND FUNERAL OF MRS. PUGSLEY

Great number of beautiful
floral tributes—Hundreds
at service—Interment at
Fernhill.

As a last tribute of respect to the late Mrs. Pugsley and of sympathy to her husband, Hon. William Pugsley, M. P., and the other members of her family, hundreds of citizens assembled yesterday afternoon to attend her funeral, which took place from her late residence, 17 Chipman Hill, to St. John's (Stone) church. At the church the impressive burial service of the Episcopal church was read by the rector, Rev. G. A. Kuhring. The full choir was present and the singing of the choir and the music of the organ, at which Dr. Arnold Fox presided, added to the beauty and impressiveness of the service.

From the church the cortege proceeded to Fernhill where the interment was made. The great number of floral tributes which had been received had been taken to the cemetery in advance of the funeral procession and were arranged about the open grave in such a manner as to give the appearance of a magnificent flower garden surrounding the grave, this arrangement being necessary on account of their number.

Lieut. Governor Wood will preside over the proceedings, which will be marked by several unusual features, including the presentation of a portrait of the late President Jack.

It was said today that honorary degrees might be conferred upon one or more judges of the supreme court who are graduates of the University. Those graduating of class of 1914 will take degrees as follows: Arts, 11; civil engineering, 10; electrical engineering, 5; forestry, 3.

The leader of the class of 1913 is Kenneth A. Baird, of this city. He had the best all round standing of the class and was a member of the Arts division.

APPLICATIONS FOR WORK ARE ON DECREASE

Especially among women—
Associated Charities
meeting—Miss Grace Rob-
ertson to attend conven-
tion.

At the meeting of the Board of Associated charities held yesterday it was decided to send a representative to the conference of charities and correction to be held in Toronto this summer, and to ask the conference to meet in St. John next year. The board also endorsed the movement to form a community council in St. John.

Miss Grace Robertson, the secretary, reported that she had received 115 applications during April. Of these 56 were applications for work, mostly from women. The secretary stated conditions during the month were about the same as last year. At present there is a good deal of work for women and applications for employment are decreasing.

On motion of Rev. W. H. Barre, it was decided to send the secretary, Miss Robertson, to the Canadian convention of charities and correction this year, and it is hoped that one or more members of the board will also be able to attend. It was announced that A. M. Belding had been appointed secretary of the conference for New Brunswick, which has not previously been represented on the Canadian organization.

A. M. Belding explained the object of the proposed community council, and referred to the meeting of representatives of various organizations to be held in the high school, Mrs. Frank Stetson, A. H. Wetmore, William Young and the secretary were

present.
