Michael J. Sullivan

Michael J. Sullivan, one of the deep sea divers who brought up eighty per cent. of the bodies in the battleship Maine, blown up in Havana Harbor in 1898, is dead in East Boston. He made his first diving at Barrington, N. S., where he worked on the steamer Brittania thirty-five years ago.

The death is announced in Chicago of William B. Prescott, president of the International Typographical Union from 1891 to 1898. He was president at the time linotype machines were being installed in newspaper offices. He opposed the policy of many printers who preferred the case, and was defeated for re-election in 1898. Mr. the prescott was one of the commissioners of the I. T. U. commission on supplementary trade education, of which he was one of the founders, and was also trustee of the fundor Printers' Home in Colorado Springs. Death was due to paralysis.

During his term of office he made several visits to Canadian centres.
