COAL SUPPLY OVERTAKES DEMAND

Ample Supplies Now for the
Consumer, Both Domestic
and Industrial—Coal Regu-
lations in Force Until Peace
is Signed.

Ottawa, March 24.—Mr. C. A. Ma-
grath, fuel controller for Canada, an-
nounced that the fuel situation has
now cleared up to such an extent that
the organization in Ottawa will ter-
minate its activities at the end of the
present month, which is also the end
of the current coal year. Ample sup-
plies of coal are now available for the
consumer, both for domestic and in-
dustrial purposes. The production in
all classes of coal—hard and soft—
has overtaken the demand.

The coal regulations will probably

be allowed to remain in force in Can-
ada until the actual declaration of
peace, although importers and dealers
will not be required to take out new
licenses for the coming coal year. In
the United States the fuel adminis-
tration, as constituted under the Lever
Act, officially continues until peace is
declared, although the organization at
Washington has been reduced to the
minimum.

Mr. Magrath observed that this

take in supplies to do so.
