## Reception And Welcome Tendered

### Knox Church Congregation Welcomed Col. Murray MacLaren and Other Returned Heroes Last Night—The Knox Honor Roll.

A reception and welcome was tendered the returned members of the Knox Church by the congregation in the Church Hall on Charles street last night. Col. Murray MacLaren being the principal guest of the evening. The hall was appropriately decorated with the flags of the Allies, and presented a most attractive appearance. The guests were welcomed by a reception committee consisting of D. M. McArthur, H. H. McNeilan, Mrs. G. M. Robertson, Mrs. G. K. McLeod and Mrs. Thos. Graham.

Dr. MacLaren, in reply, thanked the congregation for their kindness both to him and the other returned men present. As regards himself he thought that the chairman had been almost too kind in his remarks. In looking over the long honor roll it was hard to single out any particular name, for they all were most deserving of credit, but he felt that Dr. Parkes was the name that he could not pass by, for he himself had witnessed her splendid work in his own hospital in France. She had been held in high esteem by the medical men in the army. Dr. MacLaren spoke of the noble way he had been supported by the congregation in supplying comforts to his patients, and felt deeply grateful for their unflinching generosity, as he did to all the various organizations and churches throughout New Brunswick. Dr. MacLaren also spoke of the bombing of his hospital at Etaples on one occasion, when 50 of the staff were killed, officers, nurses and men; this necessitated the removal of the Canadian General No. 1 from Etaples to Trouville.

Judge Forbes was another speaker of the evening. He said he was glad to be a fellow member of the Presbyterian Church, and equally glad that he was present to assist in welcoming Dr. MacLaren. He thanked God that the doctor had been spared to return, and he hoped he would resume his old place in the life of the city. He said that it should not be forgotten that Dr. MacLaren's hospital was Canadian General No. 1, and that the doctor had been one of the first of his profession to respond to the call.

## ARMENIAN TROOPS VICTORIOUS OVER TARTAR FORCE

### The Latter, Under Command of Turkish Officers, Were Decisively Beaten After a Day's Battle.

New York, Dec. 5.—A decisive defeat has been inflicted by Armenian troops upon a Tartar force commanded by Turkish officers which invaded the neutral zone established in the Southern Caucasus, on the borderland between Europe and Asia, according to a cablegram received today by the American committee for the independence of Armenia. The message, which was sent from Erivan, the Armenian capital, said: "A Tartar force, commanded by Turkish officers, attacked the Armenians at Zengazur, which was made into a neutral zone by Colonel Haskel, the American High Commissioner to the Armenian Republic. They were decisively defeated after a day's battle, leaving over five hundred and wounded on the field of battle and several hundred prisoners, fourteen machine guns and a considerable amount of ammunition and provisions."

## CARPENTER SIGNS FOR DEMPSEY FIGHT

London, Dec. 5.—C. B. Cochran, promoter of the Carpenter-Beckett fight, announced today that Georges Carpenter has signed an agreement to fight Jack Dempsey, the American heavyweight champion next year. The purse will be 35,000 pounds, the winner taking sixty per cent. and the loser forty.

## SEWER GAS HALTS 6-DAY BIKE GRIND

New York, Dec. 5.—The six day bicycle race at Madison Square Garden was halted tonight when the fire department ordered the lights in the Garden extinguished as a precautionary measure, following an explosion of sewer gas in the neighborhood. The race was called off at 10:15 p.m. until tomorrow morning. The thousands of spectators filed quietly out of the building.
