London, Dec. 11.—Twenty thousand dollars in hand and a similar amount promised at the end of this year embroiled in mystery human interest fragment in which American millionaire's wife and a White Chapel wall played the leading parts some months ago. Filling in Newman Brook Bridge Site

City Has Opened Dump There—Power Co. Ask Concessions to Operate West Side Loop.

The city council yesterday decided to rescind the motion to call for tenders for the repairs to Nelson Wharf, West Side, and to have the work done by the harbor department by days work, as the engineer reported that it was practically impossible to prepare specifications for this class of work.

Commissioner Frink reported on the claim of the New Brunswick Power Co. that they had been overcharged in the bill for foundation under their tracks on Douglas Avenue and Prince Edward street, that the city solicitor had expressed the opinion that under the new act the company were only liable for foundation under the ties. He will present a further report on the matter.

Mayor Schofield reported that he had some correspondence with the Power Company relative to running the case on the West Side loop. The company asked many concessions which the city, he felt, could not grant, and he had written to that effect and expected a reply from the company in the near future.

Commissioner Thornton reported that on May 1, 1919, a room in the City Hall, West Side, was rented to the Dominion Adhesive Association at \$60 a year. The Martello Band desired the use of the room and as \$60 had already been paid the commissioner recommended that the room be sent to the band until May 1, 1921, in payment of \$60. Carried.

On motion of Commissioner Thornton it was decided to cancel the warrant of James A. King, a member of No. 2 Salvage Corps, as Mr. King was residing in the other end of the city.

Commissioner Frink said that a section of the Newman Brook bridge had been removed to allow the dumping of material there to fill in the gap. It was the intention to remove the bridge when the gap was filled, but so far there was not a great amount of material dumped over the culvert. He thought there was sufficient refuse available to make the fill and save the city the expense of completing the fill.

Commissioner Thornton thought that the city should take care of the class of material thrown in these dumps. Considerable difficulty had been experienced at the Elm street dump last year, he said; the fire department was called out frequently and one little girl was badly burned.

Commissioner Frink said that the refuse must be disposed of in some manner until the city established an incinerator and he had a good idea of getting a covering of soft material over the concrete culvert before the dumping of heavy stones was commenced.

It was decided to hold the council meeting this morning at the mayor's residence in the afternoon, as the mayor planned leaving the city.

**SEVERAL CASES
In Police Court**
In the police court yesterday morning, a juvenile was charged with the theft of \$45 from Miss Linsley on Nov. 24. It was alleged the lad had taken the money from Miss Linsley's overcoat pocket while the coat was hung up in the store of her employer, Roy Carbell, now and then. Miss Linsley testified the boy had come into the store to make a purchase, and while she was attending to the order he moved to the rear of the store where her coat was hanging, snatched afterwards she left to go home, and found that her pocketbook containing some \$65 to \$70 was missing.

The accused denied having stolen the money or having been in the spot alleged by Miss Linsley. He said the proprietor found nothing when he brought him before the court and searched him and another boy but did not search three other lads who were also present. The boy's father also testified.

The case was resumed in the afternoon, when the evidence of R. Carbell, Detective Donahue and a juvenile was given.
Mr. Carbell testified that he kept the store on Paradise row and that he knew the money was in Miss Linsley's coat pocket.
The juvenile witness said that Mr. Carbell had felt his pockets to see if he had the money. Cross-examined by the accused, he said that Carbell did not search him but only felt the outside of his pockets.

Detective Donahue testified that, when he arrested the accused, the latter had \$3.35, a rabbit's paw and a cigarette in his pockets. The accused told the detective that he won the money playing cards.
The magistrate deplored the existing conditions amongst the younger generation of the present day, telling of an instance where he himself saw several boys playing cards on a public thoroughfare.

He remanded the boy until this morning at 10 o'clock in order to give him an opportunity of calling other witnesses if he so desired.
Two drunks pleaded guilty and were remanded. Officers Garnett and Gillen, who made the arrests, stated they had found the two men, and the wife of one of them, drunk in the house.

Japan's Fleet Ends Biggest Manoeuvres

More Than Hundred Ships Take Part—Mutsu Not There.

Washington, D. C., Dec. 12.—No manoeuvres for our fleet this year because of the lack of fuel. However, the Japanese fleet has just completed the most extensive naval manoeuvres in its history. In respect to number of ships and types these were greater and on a larger scale than any we have ever had. They were held in the Sea of Japan in the presence of the naval base at Mairuru. All classes of ships took part, from the great Negato, which was the flagship, to the destroyers and submarines.

The manoeuvres, as usual, were those of attack and defence. The modern ships constituted the attacking force. In all more than a hundred ships took part. The battleship Mutsu, about which there has been so much controversy, did not appear. Vice-Admiral Tachibana was in command.

Even the very oldest ships took part. The old battleships Hizen and Fuji were members of the defending fleet. The Hizen was formerly the Russian Zhen. She was built at the Cramps yard at Philadelphia in 1906 and was scuttled at Port Arthur in 1904. However, she was raised and rebuilt by the Japanese and is a fine specimen of the great obsolescence. However, the Japanese fleet with coal, put a fairly big crew aboard and sent her to sea.
